## JUDGE SMITH OF BAKER IS MAIN SPEAKER

ashamed of," he stated, "it is the divine wanderlust that stands for progress. Without the wanderlust, the longing for new lands, and the betterment of conditions in general, our great country, which stands alone among the nations of the world as the greatest nation, would not be the premier nation beneath the skies."

After fully describing the growth and building up of the United States of America, Judge Smith then stated, "A country such as ours—a republic—ruled by the people, and for the people—has only one foundation—and that is the people. In democracy lies the salvation of our country."

"The great countries of Crete, Babylonia, Greece, Rome and others, who held such a high place in ancient times, all fell through the over-zealous manifestations of autocracy. Our country, if the people always keep freedom before them as the great light and ideal, will never fall."

In closing, Judge Smith laid emphasis on the great part the pioneers, not only our pioneers but throughout the country, had in the building up of the nation, and he said, "... our beloved fathers and grandfathers, the builders of the nation, will be amply repaid when they pass on—for they will take their seat in the Kingdom of Heaven with the others who so among the mighty."

Mrs. Bean sang another delightful solo, "When You and I Were Young Maggie," which was followed by several selections by the Ad Club Men's Chorus. At the close of their numbers the La Grande Band took up the work and furnished three selections before the serving of the basket dinner.

This afternoon will be devoted to impromptu reminiscences and to a general social hour. In the evening the Sons and Daughters Association will give a program, the details of which are unknown, but which, Judge Crawford states, "will be of the finest."
