GAS BOMBS TO FIGHT LOCUSTS

BAKU, Soviet Republic of Azerbaijan, June 17.—Forty airplanes equipped with poisonous gas bombs will be used to fight the swarms of locusts which are descending upon the crops of this district. The insects came from Persia. The bombs will be dropped into the swamps and other breeding places; upon exploding they will diffuse suffocating gases. The experiment will cost the Moscow government 9,000,000 Soviet rubles, or as a local humorist has said, one ruble for one locust.
