**SOFTWOODS IN BIG DEMAND NOW**

It is some years since buying of softwoods was on so large a scale or so eager as in May of this year, for it was a phenomenally active month in the lumber industry. Although since the end of May there has been somewhat of a slackening in the buying of softwoods, in a way this is not unwelcome to lumber manufacturers, for taking the country as a whole, purchases of softwoods continue to exceed production considerably. The volume of orders being received at Pacific coast mills shows only a comparatively small excess over production by these plants; but mills in the North, the South and the Southwest find that the volume of orders is considerably greater than their output. Demand for construction lumber supported the market throughout 1921, and also during the first part of 1922. This demand was at first supplied by retail lumbermen out of their stocks, for they were very careful about buying; as a result, their supplies are now low and they are eager to have rush shipments of replacement orders. Demand from wood consuming factories started to expand in the early spring of 1922 and ever since has continued to grow slowly and steadily. Thus the market, supported by retail lumber yard demand for construction materials, is now receiving additional support by demand for factory lumber. The demand from manufacturing consumers is particularly helpful to hardwood producers. This call upon them for hardwood trim and flooring has been very good this year and with the increase in buying by factories, which are the largest consumers of hardwoods, the trade is steadily expanding.

Prices, according to the American Lumberman, have not shown any marked change during the week, for although some transit cars have been disposed of at low prices the market as a whole remains very firm. Items in the most active demand, however, have shown some advances.

**MOONSHINE IS DEATH TO COWS**

BAKER, June 21.—Much has been said about the effect of moonshine on the man who imbibes too freely, especially when it does not come up to the proper standard of quality. Now come a new law that tells of the effect of mash on cattle on the range.

Dick Steadman, a rancher and cattleman of Sumpter Valley, in the city yesterday stated cattle had been feeding on a pile of mash dumped out several days ago when officers destroyed it. He discovered in the mountains near the valley. He said eight head of cattle were found that were sick from the effects of the mash and that four carcasses were discovered. They had evidently been feeding on the mash, which had been left in a pile when emptied from the barrels. Several of the animals belonged to Mr. Steadman, who has 100 head in the mountains, where stills were discovered.

**AUSTRALIAN AIR MAIL SERVICE**

SYDNEY, N. S. W., June 21.—Arrangements have progressed rapidly for the inauguration of the aerial mail, passenger and freight service between Adelaide, Sydney and Brisbane, via the Riverina and East coast.

The planes are the latest in aeronautical design and were built for use on the London-Paris service, with accommodations for six passengers and a special compartment for mail, luggage and light freight.

Special attention was paid to unusual conditions that will be encountered in the Australian traffic when the machines were constructed.

FLOUR DROPS. PORTLAND, June 21.—Following the recent decline in wheat prices, flour here dropped 20 cents a barrel. The best family flour is now \$3 a barrel wholesale. It shows the decline of 40 cents, 10 days ago.

**MEXICAN DERBY**

(By Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, June 21.—Bill Rensford, owned by F. W. Davis, an American merchant, won the Mexican derby this year from a field of 10. This was the first time the derby, hitherto a national institution, has been run since 1910.

**MANY SHEEP TO BE GRAZED SOON**

(By Associated Press) MISSOULA, Mont., June 21.—Thirty thousand seven hundred sheep, from Washington and Oregon, will graze on the Lolo national forest ranges near here this summer. The largest individual herd consists of 5,100 head owned by C. A. Hales of Pasco, Wash. A clean bill of health must be guaranteed by each shipper to the state veterinarian of Montana before the Washington and Oregon sheep are turned loose in the Lolo forest.

**MAP OF EUROPE BADLY CUT UP**

(By Associated Press) BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, June 21.—The map of Europe was so badly cut up by the peace-makers at Paris that it is still a constant puzzle to many people, especially Americans. The geography of the new Balkan republics and the countries in the Balkans and Near East seems to be particularly obscure. European postal authorities find that Americans often confuse Serbia with Siberia, Rumania with Armenia, Jugoslavia with Czechoslovakia, Bucharest with Budapest, Bulgaria with Bavaria, and so on.

"People in the United States show the most lamentable lack of knowledge of this part of the world," a prominent American diplomat in the Balkans said recently to the correspondent. Not two persons in 10 can locate the Balkan countries accurately. And I am sorry to say our government officials often show

distressing ignorance. Not long ago the American consular chief in Belgrade received an official note from the state department, the steel die of which read "Jugo-Slovakia."

To Remove Spots from Hardwood. Grease spots on hardwood floors can be removed by scrubbing the spots first in water as hot as the hand can bear and then dropping peroxide of hydrogen on them and allow it to remain until dry.

**COTTON SHORTAGE**

(By Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, June 21.—Reports from cotton-growing districts, especially from the Laguna region where the greater part of the crop is produced, indicate that there will be a shortage over normal production this year of almost 100,000 bales. The poor harvest is due to continued droughts.
