GERMAN TRADE RECOVERING

LONDON, June 22.—The rapid recovery of German trade with Chile since the war is emphasized in a report of the Department of Overseas Trade.

Chile, like many other countries, the report says, owes to British enterprise and capital its position as a factor in the world's market today.

The first British firm was established there three-quarters of a century ago and was followed shortly by many others. The Germans were not long in taking up a second position in the field, followed in very recent years by the United States.

Some years before the war Germany became a strong competitor of Great Britain, and the United States steadily gained ground. From the outbreak of the war, however, everything went in favor of the United States and from 1917 to 1921 they secured all Germany's lost trade, plus about 10 percent of the British.

"There is every indication," concludes the report, "that the British manufacturer has got much more to fear from German competition than from American. German imports to Chile increased from only 52,000 pounds in 1919 to 1,550,000 in 1921 and a very marked progress will probably be noticeable in German trade with Chile when figures are available for the present year."

SECESSION IS BEING TALKED

MEXICO CITY, June 22.—A proposal that the state of Vera Cruz secede from the republic of Mexico has been made in the legislature of that state by certain radical groups which claim that they are not adequately or justly represented in the national congress.

A resolution demanding secession has been presented to the legislature, demanding that in the forthcoming elections a number of radicals be permitted to stand for the national chamber of deputies despite a federal ruling that they are ineligible because of a number of technical reasons. It is not believed that the resolution will pass.

"The Panhandle." An immensely used in this part of the country, the phrase "the panhandle" usually refers to the northwestern portion of Texas though the word is also given to the narrow strip of land between the Colorado River and the Gulf of Mexico.

NEW RAILROAD OPERATION PLAN

(By Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, June 22.—Federal operated railroads in Mexico are henceforth to be divided into three divisions with a director general in charge of each and responsible only to the executive board of the national lines.

The first division in charge of Juan C. Dorra embraces the lines running north from Mexico City and to Tampico; the second in charge of Conrado C. Roehin embraces the lines running north and west to El Paso and the west coast; the third in charge of Jose Maria Carpio is formed of all lines to the south of Mexico City.

SUFFRAGETTES LIKE POLICING

(By Associated Press) TOKIO, June 22.—The suffragettes of Japan have been quick to take advantage of the new police regulation passed by the Diet and which came into effect on May 10, permitting women to take part in political meetings, which has heretofore been prohibited. On the evening of the day on which the prohibition was lifted the women of Kobe held their first meeting in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, they having accepted the hospitality of men as there are no women's organizations owning premises of their own.

The hall was filled an hour before the time set for the meeting, about one fourth being women and the rest men, equally divided between supporters and opponents of the women's cause. The latter interrupted repeatedly but Madame Shinko Sugai managed to go through her speech in which she demanded equal suffrage, which she demanded equal suffrage, "For 2,000 years," she added, "Japanese women have been held down by the weight of the three so-called virtues: to obey parents while unmarried, to obey husbands when married and to obey one's mother-in-law when widowed. She denounced Japanese politicians as "double tongued monsters who promised the people much but always legislated for the privileged classes" and declared that the police abused their privileges subjecting the people to control which lacked all common sense. Giving the vote to women would awaken the people to a sense of their political responsibility.

The women of Toledo and other cities waited for the first Sunday after May 10 when they held similar meetings. The Toledo meeting was largely devoted to a paper by Mrs. Kikuo Yamakawa, advocating the adoption of a Soviet form of government and lauding the Bolshevik rule in Russia.
