SCOTLAND IS WAKING UP NOW

(By Associated Press.)
LONDON, June 22.—Scotland is waking up to the fact that its lakes and waterways may be made to serve other purposes than providing scenic attraction for tourists. As proof of this the "Orkney Electric Bill" has been given a second reading in the house of commons.
The company is empowered to collect and use the waters of 15 lochs and 93 small lakes, rivers and streams, over an area of 417 square miles.
The waters proposed to be utilized are estimated to be capable of generating 50,000 horsepower to supply electricity in the counties of Pechy, Kinross and Forfar and districts in four other counties. The capital is placed at 4,500,000 pounds.
That any of the beautiful lakes and falls of "Cumbria, stern and wild" should be used to set the wheels of industry spinning many in Scotland regard almost as sacrilegious desecration. And that opinion is shared by not a few Americans who are accustomed to visit Scotland annually.
But the promoters declare that the preservation of the natural beauties of Scotland is expressly provided for by the terms of the bill. And they add that when the hum of the electrically-driven wheels of industry are heard in the land, and dykes begin to come in, the cry of "desecration" will be stifled.

BRICKLAYING CHAMPIONSHIP

LONDON, June 22.—The championship in bricklaying, from the standpoint of amount of work done by one man, is claimed by a British workman, Hotham Brown. Single handed he has just finished laying all the bricks, 700,000 of them, in the Oxford Theater at Workington, Cumberland. The job took two years. Had he worked under union rules he would have laid only 450,000 bricks in the same length of time.
The magnitude of this undertaking is shown by the fact that the building is 150 feet long and 50 feet wide and accommodates 1,400 people. Brown ignored all trade union rules and regulations and just went ahead laying brick after brick, day after day. When he had laid the first 100,000 people christened the building "Brown's monument," but it is now known in the town as "the house that Brown built."

SPECIALISTS TO MEET SOON

LOS ANGELES, June 22.—Approximately 2,000 specialists in osteopathy are expected to attend the annual international osteopathic convention here July 3-7. The convention will be held under the auspices of the American Osteopathic association. Governor W. D. Stephens of California will open the sessions, which will be presided over by Dr. Samuel L. Scothern of Dallas, Texas.

GERMANY GETS LARGE ORDERS

(By Associated Press.)
JERUSALEM, June 22.—Much of the material that is to be used in the work of developing the hydraulic power of the falls of the Jordan, near the Sea of Galilee, will be acquired from German firms. Their prices are said to be one-half those of British houses and considerably below those of American bidders.
The plan includes the construction of a dam on the Jordan river at the point where it issues from the sea of Galilee, a large storage reservoir, irrigation canals, and the installation of electric generating stations. American-Jewish organizations are said to be largely interested in the project.
The contract has been awarded to Pinhas Rutenberg, a Russian engineer by the British government. Mr. Rutenberg is now in the United States seeking financial support for the project. The work will involve an expenditure of \$10,000,000 and the employment of 8,000 men. The Russian contractor also will undertake to draw electric power from the Aala river to light the ancient city of Jaffa and the communities of Tel Aviv, Ramleh and Petach Tikvah. He is allowed two cents in which to raise the capital and start operations.

AMERICAN BOOKS IN BIG DEMAND

PARIS, June 22.—The American library in Paris, with 20,000 volumes on its shelves and its tables covered with American magazines and newspapers, draws 33 per cent of its reading room attendance from French people. It is rapidly becoming the chief connecting link between the literary interests of France and the United States and during the two years of its existence it has greatly stimulated French interest in things American.
At the beginning of 1922 the library funds amounted to 674,000 francs, and it is intended to spend much of this in enlarging existing facilities. A branch in the Latin quarter is planned, and others are contemplated.
The library is used by French ministers and many of the best-known French literary, scientific and professional men. It receives dozens of requests a week for information about America. Recently a French architect asked for all available information about skyscrapers, and several literary men came for help in writing biographies of Henry Ford and Secretary Hughes.
