PARTY LINES BADLY BROKEN

North Dakota Approaching Its Primaries With Things Political in Bad Mess.

(By Associated Press.)
 BISMARCK, N. D., June 21.—With party lines broken and disregarded, North Dakota is approaching its statewide primary June 28 with the interest centered in the struggle between the present administration and the Nonpartisan League for the control of the state government. Governor W. A. Nestor, the first governor in the history of the United States to be elected in a recall campaign, is heading the re-election of Republicans and Democrats aligned against the League. The latter is marshaling its forces under the name of Republicans, the democratic members of the League signing up as Republicans for the purpose of the primary. The primary is strictly a North Dakota affair. While a candidate for United States senator is to be elected, the league and anti-league battle enters into this and the selection of the senator is one of the queerest angles ever presented to the people of a state. Lynn J. Frazier, recalled governor is the candidate for the Nonpartisan League. Porter J. McCumber is a candidate to succeed himself, and Ormsby McHenry, of Jamestown, a former private secretary of Senator McCumber, is also a candidate. According to political observers the primary will not give a line upon the trend of national feeling. Conditions politically, they contend, are too chaotic, the party label too easily changed, for any stamp of pro or anti to be declared from the result. Something of the tangled conditions can be guessed from the fact that the names of the same men appear on petitions of candidates named for democratic and republican office. No alignment has yet been made in this net pool of politics stamping one side or the other as carrying the banner of progress, immobility or reaction. Back of all these conditions trail the years in which North Dakota has been the experimental ground for economic theories, theories which needed a political party label for functioning, and still further back, are the years in which North Dakota was attempting to alien itself under the progressive banner upheld at that time by its near native son, Theodore Roosevelt. Under these conditions six different elements entered into the campaign. The elements, each one paramount to some certain group or alignment or action follow:
 1. Interested in the state ticket and the return of Governor R. A. Nestor to the position he has filled since November 29th, last. This element has no candidate for the senatorship.
 2. The Nonpartisan League, with its members signing up as republicans, its ticket headed by former Governor Frazier as candidate for United States Senator, and with a complete state ticket, headed by R. F. Baker, of Glenburn, a former, for Governor.
 3. Democrats, supporting J. F. T. O'Connor for United States Senator and a complete state ticket.
 4. Porter J. McCumber, senator, suddenly supported by former stalwarts with followers in both the Republican and Nonpartisan camps.
 5. Protest against the purpose of the democrats to align with the independent Republicans following the primary upon certain candidates from each ticket.
 6. Protest in republican ranks against the industrial experiments the state has been trying. The preliminary campaign, up to the time of final filing for office, was a contest between the independent Republican and the McCumber forces. The independents attempted to force the senator and his immediate followers to ally themselves with the independents against the Nonpartisan League. This was met by the equally insistent demand of the supporters of McCumber that the independents ally themselves with the senator in the league question.

INDIAN DANCES THE WAR DANCE

SANTA ROSA, Cal., June 22.—To appease the wrath of offended Indian spirits, Manuel Cordova, a young brave of the Geyserville reservation, near here, recently spent all one night dancing to reports received here. There is a tradition among the Geyserville Indians that holds that the spirits of the fallen will be offended if the braves dance their war dances before strangers. Cordova violated this law early this month when he led a dance of Guilford Indian School children at Cotati near here before about 30,000 spectators. Only by dancing all night and providing a feast for his fellows could the Indian return to the favor of the gods. Although a few of the spectators heard of it, Cordova, immediately after the dance, hurried back to Geyserville, tribesmen reported, and immediately started his all-night dance. Warriors and swarms of the tribe sat around throughout the night watching Cordova and at dawn sat down to a feast at which he was host. Manuel's brother participated with him in his all-night penance and the Indian children of the Guilford school danced for several hours.
