Berries Delay Trains

The shipment of strawberries from Hood River and other western Oregon points is rapidly reaching an unnatural height. This morning nine cars, on No. 6, came through La Grande, bound for Chicago, Omaha, and other eastern points. One of the cars was slated for distribution by the branch line and the branch line train was forced to wait for the coming of the fruit. No. 4 was due at 7:17 o'clock but was two hours late, causing the branch line train to leave La Grande about 5:30 o'clock. The shipments of strawberries from western Oregon has been especially heavy the last few days and indicates that they are experiencing a bumper crop this year.

Verdict Rendered

The verdict of \$209.76, in favor of the plaintiff against the defendant in the Hildreth versus Lewis case tried in the circuit court the former part of the week was not accepted and the jury returned to the juryroom coming out at 10 o'clock Tuesday evening, after about a five hour session, with a verdict for the plaintiff against defendant Simonsen for \$250, the face of the note in question, the interest on same from April 1, 1917, and the attorney's fees and costs. This relieved Kate and J. W. Lewis of all liabilities in the case. The case had to do with the selling of a car by the defendant for which he received a note that was not paid when due.

Describes Trip

Mr. and Mrs. William Miller and children, with the exception of William, Jr., who remained to visit with relatives for a short time, have returned from an extended visit in western Oregon. They spent considerable time in Eugene and attended the graduating exercises of the University of Oregon. "The crops in western Oregon are fair," states Mr. Miller. "Strawberries are bearing extra well and the berry crop in general looks as if a bumper year was at hand. On the other hand the cherry trees are not bearing well. The prospects point to a good crop of prunes." In speaking of the weather he states that it has been almost unbearable. No rain for some time, which is a rare thing in the western part of the state.

Nature's Supreme Wisdom

If it were not for the check that winter interposes, vegetation would climb skyward until we had tropical jungles and flowers high in the branches of the forest, instead of violets and daisies and lady-slipper orchids. As it is, the year's tender growths decay in the wet and cold of winter, furnish shelter to the seeds of grasses and small woodland plants, and so foster a new growth for the coming of spring. Even in decay there is a purpose; in nature always there is a new beginning.—Youth's Companion.
