CHRISTIANS IN CHINA CONFER

Largest Meeting of Kind Ever Held in That Country Was During Last May.

SHANGHAI, June 22.—At what was held to be the greatest religious gathering ever held in China, the National Christian Conference, which assembled in Shanghai in the first week of May with twelve hundred delegates attending, a review of the whole vast field of Protestant Christian mission work in China was undertaken and changes of procedure of the highest importance to general mission endeavor in China were authorized.

The main body of delegates that came from all parts of China numbering a thousand was about evenly divided, half Chinese and half foreign. In addition to these some two hundred visiting delegates from foreign countries attended the conference including 24 from America, 19 from Great Britain and 5 from countries of continental Europe. Among the prominent figures attending the big meeting from other lands were Dr. John R. Mott of the World's Student Christian Federation, F. S. Brockman of the Y. M. C. A., K. S. LaMonte, formerly of the Yale Mission and now holding the chair of missions at Yale University, Marshall Brounhall of the home staff of the China Inland Mission, Dr. H. T. Houghton of the Friends' Foreign Missionary Association, J. H. Oldham, secretary of the International Mission Council, Dr. Carl Heim of the Basle Mission, Count J. Moltke of the Danish Mission Council and Bishop Nicholas of Serbia.

An outstanding feature of the conference was the voicing of a desire and purpose by a purely Chinese conference commission that a united Christian church indigenous to China shall come into being. The single big achievement of the conference, however, was the authorization of a decided modification in the method of co-ordinating Protestant Christian mission work in China.

In offering the report it made, the Chinese commission, composed of men and women, expressed regret that Christian churches are divided by denominationalism and the West, Dr. T. T. Lee, spokesman of the commission, pointed out that this denominationalism is based upon differences, the historical significance of which, however real and vital to the missionaries of the west, is not understood by Chinese. For this reason, he said, denominationalism instead of being a source of inspiration has been and is a source of bewilderment and inefficiency. The speaker expressed the belief that it is only the united church that can save China.

The change made by the conference in the method of co-ordinating mission work brings to a termination the activities of The China Continuation Committee, a body that grew out of the Missionary Conference of 1911 in Shanghai and a number of preceding conferences at Canton, Shanghai, Tsinanfu, Peking, Hankow and Mukden. Since it was formed this committee has served as a means of communication between

the Protestant Christian forces of China and mission organizations of Western countries. Its aim has been to promote co-operation and co-ordination among Christian forces in China and generally to serve as a clearing house in connection with all aspects of missionary work in China.

Through the change effected at the conference this work is being taken over and its scope enlarged by a National Christian Council having 100 members, representing Protestant Christian denominational interests and acting in an advisory capacity without, however, having any powers in connection with doctrinal or ecclesiastical questions.

ADVERTISING FOR CHURCHES

NEW YORK, June 22.—Newspapers advertising to further the spread of the gospel is strongly advocated by the publicity department of the Episcopal church, which has brought out its recommendations, after a thorough study of the question of advertising, in a pamphlet entitled "A Handbook of Church Publicity," issued under the authorization of the National Council of the church.

"No one can look at the newspapers and magazines and doubt that it pays to advertise," said the Rev. Robert F. Gibson, executive secretary of the publicity department, and author of the text book. "Why should not this method of such proven efficiency be used for the propagation of the gospel? Advertising is not necessarily sensational. It merely seems to be so because we are not accustomed to it for church purposes."

One of the striking features of the book is Mr. Gibson's strong advocacy of the fullest use by the churches of the advertising columns of the daily press not only for mere church notices, but for spreading the gospel among the masses.

"We have thought of publicity in the newspapers as merely a method of giving the public notice of a service or a meeting, or of making public the account of something that has taken place," says Mr. Gibson. "We have thought too much of building up the attendance at a service or of exploiting persons or organizations. We are only beginning to think of church publicity in the public press as evangelistic in purpose. The newspapers themselves are really far ahead of the churches in their recognition of this evangelistic opportunity. Many editors are convinced that the problems of the world will never be solved rightly until Christian principles are applied and that therefore it is one of the functions of the public press to present and apply Christian principles."

"Advertising with an evangelistic purpose," says Mr. Gibson, "where the aim is to reach the unchurched, must be in the newspapers."

Mr. Gibson suggests a form of advertising to churches which will take the shape of a miniature sermon, "briefly interpreting some passage of scripture or helpfully applying some Christian principle." Sermonettes of a hundred words in length, with the name of the preacher and his church annexed are also recommended.

Mr. Gibson's conclusions and recommendations are the outcome of a resolution adopted by the National Council at its Washington meeting last July.
