CIVILIZATION KILLING TREES

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., June 24.—Advancing civilization is bringing death to the hardy old oak trees which dot the central California coast counties and which have figured in the state's colorful history, according to Dr. George J. Pierce, professor of botany and plant physiology at Stanford University.

California always has had its oaks, and the Spanish name for the tree, "encino," is a common name in the state. Even the city of Oakland gained its name from the fact that on its site were many oak trees.

Recently when the oaks in this section showed signs of dying, a "Save the oaks" campaign was launched. Dr. Pierce was consulted and said that while the old oaks could not live, young native oaks could be set out and in a few years would be large enough to prove the character of the scenery. Oaks grow rapidly and a tree planted from an acorn here in 1908, he said, is now of good size.

"A majority of the older oak trees are doomed," Dr. Pierce said. "Only the inner bark and the outer wood are sound—the rest is hopelessly diseased."

"The oaks are not able under modern conditions to resist the ravages of diseases which attack the wood. With the spread of urban conditions, the trees are forced to fight unnatural odds. Drought, suffocation and poison gases are the enemies which attack the trees when the ground around them is surfaced with cement, asphalt or oil."

"The sewer, leakage from which comes a miasma when an impenetrable surface makes the escape of gases impossible. The air is shut out from above and the poison shut in. This combination weakens the tree's resistance to disease. In addition to this, water is either prevented from reaching the roots at all or is poured in through a small aperture around the trunk in such quantity that the tree is drowned."

"If young saplings were put in wherever an old tree dies or is taken out, it would soon be large enough to preserve the character of the scenery. The young trees will be able to adapt themselves to the changed conditions under which they must live as the old trees were unable to do."

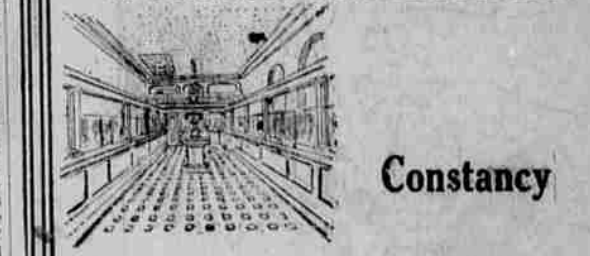
