Apartment House Owner of Los Angeles Solves Many Perplexing Problems.

LOS ANGELES, June 24.—Pondering this perplexed landlord:

"Genuine hospitality is more important than mere modern conveniences in successfully operating apartment houses and hotels."

And these tenants who rail at a high rental:

"The average apartment house dweller is responsible for one-fifth of the increase of his basic housing cost by sheer wastefulness."

Mrs. Alice Phillips, striding figure among American hotel managers, has in four years converted a handful of people into \$200,000.

She has just confirmed her opinion in a national tour of hotel inspection to glean further comfort ideas for her new 35-suite hotel apartment.

"While I get few material suggestions," said Mrs. Phillips, "I was very much impressed with the fact that hearty courtesy has failed to keep pace with smartness and sumptuousness in many of the country's big establishments."

"And that is the source of many of the failures of just living success."

"Magnificence devoid of warm, simple friendliness repels thousands of would-be patrons."

"With my two children, I used to live on a remote ranch," she explained. "I served fruit, milk, sharing whatever I had, to the occasional traveler FREE, for sheer love of company. Luncheon taught me the power of simple hospitality. And today, and running a home on \$50 a month taught me frugality."

"When four years ago I got my first furnished apartment lease on a bare premises, note for \$150 a month, I applied the same system of consideration and the same genuine desire to serve."

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 24.—One hundred of Cleveland's largest industrial plants registered a new gain in employment figures in May.
