Also "Lovesick at Sea," a comedy.

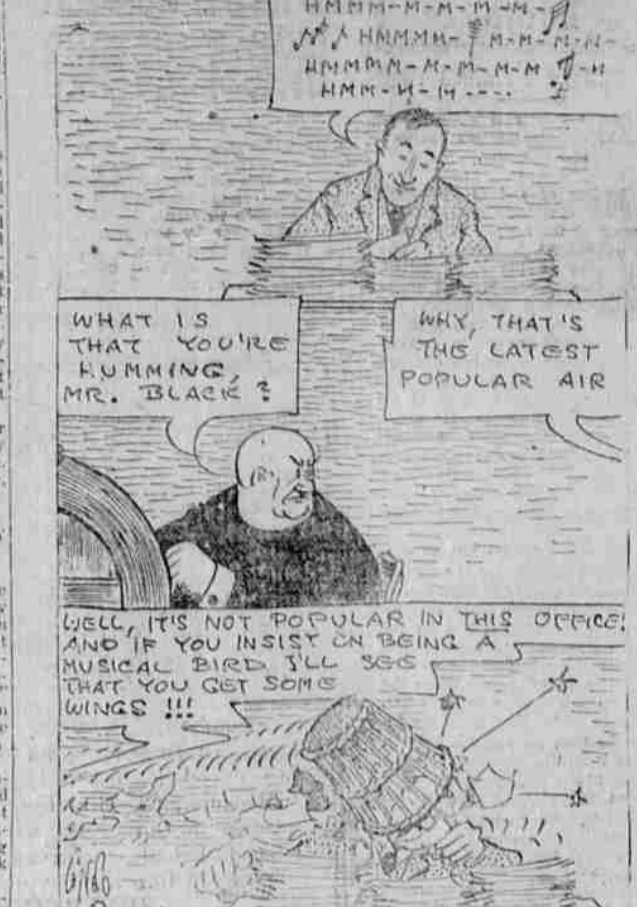
LOCAL GIRLS POPULAR IN "45 MINUTES FROM BROADWAY."

OVER THOUSAND SENT TO PRISON

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—Seven hundred and seventy prisoners were committed to the California state penitentiary at San Quentin in 1921. Oliver C. Lature, chairman and director of education at the prison, declared here recently. Of that total not one was a college graduate and only 193 had completed a high school course, Mr. Lature said.

"Robbery was the crime for which 159 of the men were committed," he added. "Of this number 31 had no education in any language, five claimed to be high school graduates, one had finished a year at college and two had secured two years at college. Thirty-eight of the prisoners were laborers, ten were clerks, six were miners, eight were truck drivers, eight were chauffeurs and a possible two or three per cent were high grade mechanics."

RAILROADS GUILTY (By Associated Press) CHICAGO, June 27.—Four railroads were found guilty of violations of the transportation act and the orders of the United States railroad labor board in six decisions covering the contracting of work to outside firms, an issue over which the railway shippers of the country were now taking a strike ballot.

TRIAL WARFARE JOHANNESBURG.—Tribal warfare has been resumed in Bechuanaland. Many villages have been destroyed.

NEW DYKE BEING BUILT (By Associated Press) PEKING, June 27.—With funds granted by the American Advisory famine relief committee the authorities are building a new dyke at a bend in the Yellow river where it changed its course to the north about 70 years ago. The dyke will protect 200 villages. About 15,000 famine refugees are employed in the work.
