IMMIGRATION IS INCREASING
MOSCOW, June 29.—Immigration of American or Russian-American workmen is becoming an increasingly important factor in Russian industry, Ludwig Martens, former "Soviet Ambassador to the United States," who now is in charge of this department in Russia recently reported to the Council of Labor and Defense that over 5,000 of these immigrants have recently arrived. Many others are on their way, including mechanics, agricultural groups and technical experts. The council of Labor and Defense resolved to support this immigration because it does not burden Russia, but on the contrary lightens the situation as the immigrants bring their own food and tools.
