OFFICER SLAYS BRITISH HOBO

PENDLETON, June 29.—Leo Raymond, a hobo, probably 30 years old, was shot and killed by Glenn Bushie, special agent of the O. W. R. & N. company, as the result of his refusal to submit to arrest and threatening to hit the officer with a big rock.

The shooting occurred in the east end of the city, near St. Anthony's hospital about 1:15 p. m. as the Council Bluffs manifest freight train was leaving Pendleton. Several eyewitnesses were called for the coroner's hearing. Raymond carried a card from a British marine cooks, and waiters' union, issued in Australia, and evidently he had been transferred to Canada. He got on the freight train at Rich, about eight miles west of Pendleton. Here he was ordered off by Agent Bushie, and after getting on again climbed on the rear end of the train for standing a ride, and managed to get aboard before the train started. In the east end of the city the train stopped by a signal and Raymond was again ordered off by Bushie, who had drawn his pistol.

Raymond got off and seized a big rock. Bushie also got off, and as he approached the hobo, the latter threatened to hit him if he did not put his automatic up. Bushie then declared the man under arrest and told him that if he resisted, that he would be shot.

The hobo raised the big rock and was reported to have said: "Put up your gun or I'll kill you." Here Bushie placed his automatic in the holster and advanced barehanded to arrest Raymond.

Just in time to avert a crashing blow from the hobo, he said, Bushie pulled his automatic and shot, the bullet entering at the breast bone and drilling Raymond's body. Spectators gathered. Bushie called the sheriff's office and the sheriff taken the coroner. The body was taken to E. B. Wooten, his chief, in Pendleton. He turned his pistol over to the district attorney.

M'PARLAND IS AGAIN ELECTED

Typographical Union Head Receives Majority of Over 4500 Votes. IN DANAPOLIS, Ind., June 29.—John McParland of New York City was re-elected president of the International Typographical union by a majority of 4545 over Walter W. Barrett of Chicago, his only opponent.

McParland received 4545 votes, while Barrett received 4000 votes. The election was held at the Danapolis convention of the union.
