TELESCOPE IS BEING ERRECTED

Third Largest Instrument of Kind Being Built in Ohio— Three Years to Build It.

DELAWARE, O., July 1.—With in the next few years there will arise an Observatory hill on the campus of Ohio Wesleyan University here a huge concrete building with a huge glass reflecting telescope. It will be the third largest telescope in the world.

Prof. Perkins has lived with one dominating goal—to be able to turn enough money over to Ohio Wesleyan University for the purchase of such a telescope. Not only did he derive all his income from his investments in his telescope fund, but he often contributed to it from his meager salary as a college professor. He and Mrs. Perkins trimmed their household budget to make the sacrifice possible.

Under the terms of his gift, the telescope is to be used first for the instruction of all the students of the university; second it is to be turned over to the public at regular intervals, and after that it is to be used for research.

MARION'S BIRTH TO BE OBSERVED

MARION, O., July 1.—President Harding, General John J. Pershing, Hartford Mackler, national commander of the American Legion, and other nationally and internationally known figures are expected here early in July to attend the celebration of the centennial of Marion's birth, July 2, 3, 4 and 5 have been fixed as the dates for the observance, but to date no definite program of speech-making has been arranged.

Monday morning, July 2, will be given over entirely to religious exercises in the churches and in the afternoon there will be a union church service in the Christyana mission, where nearly two years ago President Harding was officially notified of his nomination by the republican convention.

Tuesday morning there will be a program for the children, including a children's horse show. In the afternoon the local American Legion post will stage an independence day celebration and in the evening there will be a program of fireworks.

Wednesday is planned as the big day of the celebration, to begin with a mammoth parade in which all periods of the city's growth will be shown. The part of the American Legion in the program will be taken by its representatives from most of the 550 posts in the state. In the afternoon it is planned to have a speaking program in the downtown section and at the termination the legion will have a picnic. On that day the legion is to have a state convention.

The final event of the program will be a pageant at the fairground Wednesday evening. The pageant has been written by Miss Eleanor M. Freehand, formerly of Marion, but now of Pittsburgh. It will depict Marion's history.

MICE PRESENT BIG PROBLEM

SYDNEY, N. S. W., July 1.—Hope that one of the Australian farmer's greatest problems—protecting wheat against the attacks of mice—is near solution has risen from successful tests conducted by a Sydney doctor of a protective preparation he had evolved.

The value of the discovery may be gauged from the fact that the records of the wheat board show losses of 500,000 pounds in New South Wales alone directly attributed to the ravages of mice.

The final test was conducted by the inventor, Dr. Henry Holtz, in the presence of representatives of the wheat board, primary producers and the press. Mice were sealed in an iron tank with large supplies of bread and wheat, which were enclosed in sacks and cardboard boxes which had been sprayed with the solution evolved by the doctor. Some as long ago as 15 months. When the tank was broken open after two days, it was found that the mice had made no attempt to eat either the wheat or the bread. No tracks or teeth or claws being found on the boxes or bags. All of the mice were dead, apparently preferring to starve rather than approach the solution.
