POTATO BUG INVADES WESTON

PENDLETON, July 1.—The much feared potato bug, known as the Colorado potato beetle, has made its appearance at Weston, in the city limits, and drastic steps are being taken to stop the invasion, for the protection of the famous Weston potato hills. The entire town was scoured by the fire-department and thousands of traps were taken to snare the insects and their eggs.

The bug has done damage at Hot Wells and in the Walla Walla valley but has never before been in Weston. County Agent Fred Hanson is watching the development closely. He says the bug is only seen in small numbers here, but it is completely exterminated the potato vine.

EXPLORER IS MAKING SURVEY

SHANGHAI, July 1.—Arthur de Sowerby, explorer and naturalist, who is engaged in making biological survey in China for the United States National Museum arrived in Shanghai in May from a second expedition into the province of Fukien.

On the trip that he has completed Mr. Sowerby first went into the district south of Foochow where he hunted tigers, but without success through securing many other interesting things. His next proceeding was the Min river, held to be one of the most beautiful streams in China, to Yungting. He camped for several weeks in the high mountains behind this city making valuable collections.
