AT SHERRY'S LAST DAY "THE WORLD'S CHAMPION"
 With Wallace Reid in a most notable role, Lois Wilson as his leading woman and a splendid cast including Lionel Belmore, Henry Miller, Jr., Helen Dunbar, S. J. Sandford and Guy Oliver. "The World's Champion," the new Paramount picture which was shown at the Sherry theatre yesterday, is living up to its name. The hero is the battling son of a meek, nobility-worshipping British commoner. There are three flat encounters—the first when the son pays informal court to a lady and daughter of the nobility and is attacked for his forwardness by her escort, Lord Brockington, and thereafter; the second, a ring bout wherein the hero wins the middleweight championship while in America, and the third battle with Lord Brockington in which the now trained fighter returns him a dose of his own medicine. Mr. Reid is in his usual good form as a love-maker and the picture is not lacking in romance. The characters, all English humorous types, provide a wealth of rare humor and are well portrayed. NOTED ATHLETE STAR IN MOTION PICTURES
 William Fox has launched a new screen star in "Buckling the Line," a picturization of the popular story, "The Real Man," by Francis Lynde, which will be shown at the Arcade Theatre tonight only. Maurice Flynn, who won world-wide fame as a football star for Yale, is declared to be one of the most attractive figures on the screen. It was only after roving and adventuring and spending some time in the offices of his father, a well-known New York financier, that Maurice came to the conclusion that the motion picture would furnish an ideal career for him. Standing well over six feet, athletic, handsome, and possessed of a fund of varied experience, he found himself well equipped for his new employment, and his rise to stardom on the screen was rapid. In "Buckling the Line," Maurice Flynn is supported by Molly Malone the noted screen beauty, in the feminine lead. Four acts of vaudeville will also be presented.

TAFT EXPLAINS U. S. ATTITUDE

LONDON, July 3.—William Howard Taft, chief justice of the United States supreme court, told a British audience that America was not likely to pay much attention to European politics unless the price of wheat was affected. The former president was addressing the English Speaking Union, which gave a luncheon in his honor. Captain Frederick E. Great, secretary of state for all, presided. "To the man in Cincinnati, Chicago, St. Louis or in the West," said Mr. Taft, "Europe seems very far away. What is happening on this side of the ocean does not interest him very much unless the price of wheat or other commodities is affected." The former president discussed arbitration as a means of settling disputes and justifiable issues, and explained why the proposed treaties of arbitration between the United States, France and England had failed to pass the American senate. "We all felt," he added humorously, "that these treaties were going down the corridors of time as a great human achievement. But the senate thought otherwise. By the time our lawmakers got through with them, I, as father of the treaties, did not recognize them. But you must not interpret our government's action. They did not dissent from arbitration; they simply did not want to bind themselves to something which they were not willing to carry out in letter and spirit."
