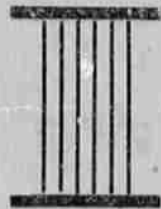

NO TROUBLE IN LA GRANDE FROM STRIKE

(Continued from Page One)

At the meeting of the strikers yesterday noon reports were received covering many phases of the local situation, indicating that the strikers would continue to live up to the request of their officials in every way to uphold the law and preserve order. Roy Flexer, chief of police, was thanked by the committee in charge of the strike for the attitude he has taken on the situation.

Chief Flexer declared that his department would maintain a strictly neutral attitude in the strike and that there was no need for special police. In discussing the latter phase of the situation he said: "Special police are not needed. You all live here and we know all of you. The police department has never had to hire special police on account of any of you, so why should we hire specials now?"

It was reported to the strikers at the meeting that 12 men had been hired at Pendleton to be sent to Rieth this morning to take the place of strikers and that 18 or 20 men had arrived in La Grande to act as strikebreakers. They were reported quartered at the Foley hotel. They were to go to work this morning, it was said at the meeting.

At Huntington everything was at a standstill, according to the report made to the meeting. C. F. Roberts, assistant superintendent of the second division, was reported at work at Rieth and Traveling Engineer Daniels was reported having been sent to Huntington to go to work.

The strike committee announced that it regrets very much the atti-

tude of Special Agent Rooney of the O. W. R. & N., who is hiring the special police. According to the reports made to the committee Mr. Rooney wants the men taking the strikers' places to be armed. D. L. McKay, chairman of the strike committee, said in discussing this subject: "This action on the part of Mr. Rooney is uncalled for. The strikers have no intention of causing the men hired by the company or the officials of the company any alarm. Nor do we intend to go on the company's property."

The Big Fog Brotherhoods were thanked by the committee yesterday for the stand they have taken in refusing to "scab," an agreement having been made by the brotherhoods not to take the places of strikers and reports indicating that they are living up to their agreements were received Sunday.

The strike situation from the strikers' standpoint was declared to look better as additional reports were being received from the Union Pacific headquarters in Omaha.

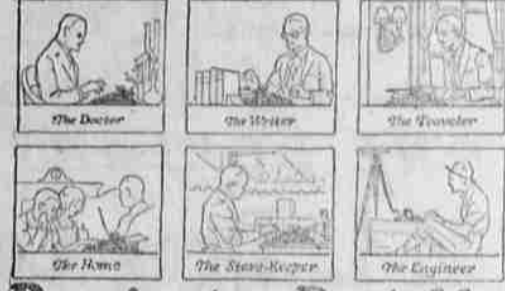
