WAR FINANCE LEANS HEAVY

SPOKANE, Wash., July 8.—Agricultural and livestock interests of Washington have requested \$2,163,456 in loans through the war finance corporation, a total to a recapitulation by R. L. Rutter, president of the Spokane Eastern Trust company, chairman of the Washington agricultural agency, which approves the loans and recommends them to the war finance corporation.

In a letter to Eugene Meyer, managing director of the corporation, Mr. Rutter declares this financial assistance "has been a great benefit to those interested." The board has approved for the agency 26 applications for \$30,012,484 and has made direct advances to the Washington-Idaho Wheat Growers' association of \$1,254,739.

Commenting on the activities of the corporation, Mr. Rutter says in part: "The collateral pledged with the 26 applications approved to banks consisted of 291 unsecured and secured notes nearly all unacceptable at the federal reserve bank on account of being justifiably and insufficiently quick assets."

The 19 applications approved to livestock associations were secured by 30 collateral notes and were secured by livestock consignment valued at \$194,178. The advances made to the Idaho-Washington Wheat Growers' association, \$1,254,739, have all been paid back to the war finance corporation."

NEW FOOTBALL GROUNDS BUILT

PASADENA, Cal., July 8.—When football season rolls around this city will step to the center of the stage and offer a brand new playground for the warriors in the form of a mammoth stadium in the Arroyo Seco. The structure, when complete, will cost \$6,000,000 and will be composed in shape of the pentagon or excavation type of rounded earth and with modern tiers of seats.

The first game in the new stadium will be played October 28, when the University of California football eleven will clash with the University of Southern California team. Two weeks later, on Armistice Day, the annual Army-Navy struggle will be played and two months following the huge structure will be formally dedicated with an East vs. West conflict on New Year's Day.

At present the stadium is just half completed. Excavation tunnels are all in, excavation is rapidly progressing and by August 1, the field will be in the hands of the gardeners for the laying of the turf.

STRIKERS AID IN RAIL WRECK

SALT LAKE, July 8.—Eight passengers were injured, two seriously, when five Pullman cars of Salt Lake-Los Angeles passenger train No. 8, eastbound, plunged from the track near Pehrson, 60 miles west of Salt Lake, late Wednesday afternoon.

A run-dinked rail caused the derailment, according to the railroad's report Thursday. All the injured were reported to be improving. Assistance was rendered by a crew of 12 striking railroad employees, who came a distance of more than 65 miles to help in putting the derailed cars back on the track.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—M. P. Kinkaid, member of the house of representatives from the Sixth Nebraska district, died here Thursday. The death of the Nebraska congressman occurred at Garfield hospital here, and resulted from a complication of diseases from which he had been ill since early in May. Funeral services will be held at O'Neill, Neb., his home.

Mr. Kinkaid, who would have completed 25 years of continuous service in the house next March, recently announced that he would not seek re-election. He was chairman of the committee on irrigation of arid lands, and was author of the Kinkaid homestead act.

CONVENTION TO BE IN NEW TOWN

MIAMI, Fla., July 8.—Floridians have an abiding faith in the future of the state and are regarded as probably the most optimistic people in the country in that respect, but the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen has given the optimistic native one better. The big railroad employees' union has selected as the site for its 1925 national convention a Florida "city" which is not yet on the map.

When it was announced from Toronto recently that the Trainmen would meet three years hence in Hollywood, Fla., newspapers in this city mentioned the selection. Some were greeted that perhaps the city had been garbled in translation and the wires and that it should be Hollywood, Calif., while others thought it might be Holly Hill, Fla., or Holly Hill is a flag-stop on the route between Orono and Daytona.

Inquiry at headquarters of the Trainmen in Cleveland, O., developed that Hollywood, near Miami, was the place named but that in selecting if the organization had provided that, in the event Hollywood would not be able to accommodate the convention of 1925 the meeting would be held in Spokane, Washington.
