LUMBER OUTPUT IS LESSENER

The production of lumber last week was small because of the month of July shutdown. At this season it is customary to overhaul the sawmills carefully, to repair machinery and sometimes to install considerable new equipment. This year, however, indications are that lumber manufacturers will make only absolutely necessary repairs and will resume sawing as soon as possible. The reason for this is that demand continues to be excellent and still exceeds production. Stocks at manufacturing points, therefore, continue to be low and will not so well assorted as shipments would like to have them. Lumber manufacturing is being pushed out it seems doubtful if the total output can be greatly increased. In some sections common labor has left the sawmills to work in the harvest fields, while in other cases there is a scarcity of skilled workers. These factors naturally affect production and render it difficult to add night shifts where only one shift is now running.

Demand, according to the American Lumberman, continues to come from all classes of trade. Home building is very active in cities and suburban territory, while a steady and promising increase in demand from the strictly rural sections is making itself felt. Retail lumbermen who sell principally to the farm trade are not overburdened with business, but they are getting a fair sized volume and prospects for an increase are exceedingly good. Prices as a whole have shown no change. The tone of the market is firm and desirable stock sells without a great deal of difficulty.
