ELSIE FERGUSON AT "FOOTLIGHTS"

Elsie Ferguson, who is starring in "Footlights," a Paramount picture which will be shown at the Arcade Theatre Tuesday and Wednesday brings to her role the finesse of both stage and screen experience. The part, which portrays an American, who is introduced on the New York stage as a Russian actress, challenges the best of Miss Ferguson's art. In one scene she gives an Impersonation of Eddie Foy and in another, she has a fencing bout. All through the picture there are the two personalities at play, the one of the puritanical New England girl, and that of the pampered Russian actress.

In making this picture, Miss Ferguson has broken a precedent. She has refused to appear in many plays and pictures, dealing with the stage feeling that no true presentation of the profession has been given. "Footlights" tells the story of a vaudeville entertainer who becomes the most famous actress in America. Her rise to fame, although unique in every way, is made through struggles, hardships and sacrifice. It is not the exaggerated story of an overnight career with flowers and dinner parties. To reach this height, Lizzie Parsons, had to give up her friends and past associations and lose her identity in that of a Russian.

Miss Ferguson's interpretation of this role makes "Footlights" the outstanding picture of the year. Reginald Donny heads a capable supporting cast of players. Round four of the "Leather Pushers" will also be shown.

MARK TWAIN TEACHES

BY CAUSING LAUGHTER

"Learn while you laugh, and laugh while you learn." This might have been the motto that Mark Twain kept on his desk, and he was right. A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court, which, in film form, is coming to the Arcade Theatre this week as a special William Fox attraction. But Mark Twain had no such idea. "A Connecticut Yankee" was not meant to be instructive. It was meant to throw ridicule upon the idea that the Middle Ages were a better time than the present. But it takes in spite of itself. The adventures of young Martin Gwynedd among King Arthur's knights and ladies tell better than all the history books, just what life in the Middle Ages was like—without plumbing, without telephones, without good roads.

"A Connecticut Yankee" is the modern Don Quixote. It has done more than any other book or play to prove that men are as chivalrous today as they were in the days "when knights were bold."

In confirmation of all the advance information that has been gleaned about Rita Weiman's first photoplay written directly for the screen, the Goldwyn presentation of "The Grim Comedian," at the Sherry Theatre, seems as if to add a word of commendation for the author's admirable work, as well as for the fine treatment it has received at the hands of the director, Frank Lloyd, and a cast of excellent players. Though the subject is delicate, there is nothing suggestive or undignified in the story. The drama revolves upon a mother's sacrifice for her daughter's welfare. But to reveal the story would be to mar the observer's enjoyment. Suffice it to say that the background is theatrical life behind the scenes.

Many of the most beautiful night scenes we have ever seen on the screen show the white lights of Broadway at their whitest. It is said that Mr. Lloyd, the director, took his foot-landing players all the way from California to New York to photograph a few scenes on Broadway. These were taken by North Bros. The results are well worth the effort. The principal players in a well-balanced cast are Phoebe Hunt, Gloria Hope, Jack Holt and John Harrow.
