Prizes to encourage excellence in agriculture have been formed by the Union Pacific for boys in 15 counties in this state, according to an announcement made from the office of the president of the system, C. H. Gray, at Omaha. Umatilla county is included in the counties where prizes

will be awarded. The announcement of the system is a follow-up.

The Union Pacific System offers to the boy between sixteen and twenty-one years of age ranking the highest in the boys and girls club work for the year 1922, in corn, potato, or wheat counties, in each of the following counties of the state of Oregon, a seventy-five dollar scholarship in the College of Agriculture, or the Short Winter Course of the Oregon Agricultural College.

Counties: Baker, Crook, Deschutes, Gilliam, Harney, Hood River, Jefferson, Marion, Malheur, Multnomah, Sherman, Union, Umatilla, Wasco.

In addition, the Union Pacific System will reimburse the student for the expense of railroad transportation from his home to Corvallis, Oregon, and return, over its lines.

(A)—Seventy-five per cent on rank in club work.

(B)—Twenty-five per cent on activities of the boy in community affairs.

The winner shall be chosen from among the ten boys ranking highest in the county club projects, as outlined by the agricultural college.
