LONDON, July 18.—There is less enthusiasm in England than in France over the proposed return match of Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, and Georges Carpentier, world's light heavyweight champion, although the genuine British fighting fan is making much noise in the hope that the bout may be staged in London. Those financially interested in the proposal are disappointed with the feeble public response.

Some of the British sports writers agree vehemently against the pair meeting again, "Funch," England's greatest boxing expert, asserting in the London Times that the result of the battle at Boyle's Thirty Acres in Jersey City last July was so decisive that Carpentier has no reason for soliciting another attempt at the crown and that the whole proposition is absurd.

His latest achievement was knocking out Frank Burns, the middleweight champion of Australia, making Lewis the title-holder of the Empire in that division.

Up until the 11th and last round of the bout Burns outpointed Lewis, in the opinion of several boxing experts, but in that period the Kid made a clever feint and then crossed a smashing right to the jaw that landed the Australian on his back. Lewis was criticized for holding part of the way. Burns lost the championship, for which he had come all the way from Australia, but he took home a gold medal for rescuing a drowning man. HUGE DAM UNDER CONSTRUCTION

(By Associated Press.) MODESTO, Cal., July 18.—Construction work is going ahead on time on the great five million dollar Don Pedro dam and electrical power project being constructed 12 miles east of Modesto on the Tuolumne river by the Modesto and Tuolumne Irrigation districts. Engineers say it will be completed as planned by next May.

The dam is to create a reservoir that will store 265,000 acre feet of water. It will contain 265,000 yards of masonry, will be 283 feet high, 174 feet thick at the base, 20 feet thick at the top and will have a width or spread of 1,000 feet.

Authorities say that the dam will be the highest in the world above the stream bed. It is resting on a solid rock river bed that required no excavation for the superstructure.

The dam will be able to generate 25,000 horse power units of electricity. This power is to be sold to the people of the community in competition with private electrical companies.

At present the two districts own a dam at La Grange which is supplying water for 225,000 acres. The water storage of the Don Pedro and La Grange dams will be sufficient to irrigate 500,000 acres.
