SALEM TO CLOSE TO PICK BERRIES

SALEM, July 14.—Members of the Salem Business Men's league, at a meeting here Monday decided to close their respective establishments all day today in order that both the merchants and employees may go into the fields and assist in saving the berry crop. More than 100 merchants and shop owners are affected by the ruling of the league.
 The proposal to close the stores and shops one day this week was advanced at a luncheon of the Commercial club, when it was reported that more than \$250,000 worth of berries would be lost unless more pickers were obtained at once. Later in the day the Business Men's League called a meeting and it was decided to put the closing suggestion into effect.
 More than 100 automobiles left Salem early this morning for the berry field. These cars were loaded with merchants, employees of stores and shops and all office men who can leave their duties for the day.
 The continued dry and warm weather has ripened the berries rapidly, and in many sections of the county the pickers have been unable to keep pace with the crop. In other parts of the county reports indicated that the berries were rotting on the vines for want of pickers. As a last resort the growers today appealed to the commercial club for assistance in saving their crops.
