### OUTLOOK BRIGHT FOR LUMBERING

Lumber conditions in the north west continue to be generally satisfactory, according to a review of the situation issued by the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen. In regard to the situation in eastern Oregon the review says:

After a brief fourth of July pause, logging, lumber manufacturing and shipping have been resumed at full one-shift capacity for the district, with orders still somewhat ahead of production. Manufacturers have reasonable assurance that the balance of the year will show equitable results. Gas supply to date has been satisfactory.

No forest fires of moment have been reported. Most camps are running full-handed. Mills report hot supply ample.

Nearly all mills are running to

capacity. The George Palmer Lumber company at La Grande started a night shift July 6. The Grand Rapids at Perry has been running one shift only, being short of logs on account of cleaning up old camps. Some railway shunt strikers are applying for work, but mill operators prefer experienced lumber help. Except for the railroad men there is no unemployment reported. There is a scarcity of good lumber graders. Some shifting from mill to mill has been noted recently, but men are generally steady.

### MRS. LEVY IS LAID TO REST

PORTLAND, July 21.—The funeral of Mrs. Babetta Werhimer Levy of Union, was held here yesterday afternoon, Rabbi Wise officiating. Interment was in Beth Israel cemetery. Mrs. Babetta Werhimer Levy,

born at Bodeswiler, Baden, Germany, on January 25, 1843, died at Union, Ore., on July 18. Mrs. Levy was the widow of Adolph Levy, who died in 1906. She is survived by Leon, Milton S., Estella, Edna Levy and Mrs. Helen Lewis, of Union; Gus S. Levy of La Grande; Julius A. Levy, of College Place, Washington, and Mrs. Minnie Bloch of this city.

### LONG DISTANCE WALKER ON WAY

"Never again," said John Silva, who tramped into town this morning on his way from Boston to San Francisco accompanied by his dog. "The reason I am making such a trip is worth it—just the same I'm going to win that wager or bust." And so, after stopping for a short time here, he continued on his wearisome tramp with the dog following close behind him.

Silva comes from a good home in Boston and has somewhat of a sporting nature. Therefore, when a friend offered to bet him \$2000 that he could traverse the American continent in company with his dog in one year and return to Boston, he jumped at the bet and started on his way. Boston as his end and Fresno at the other were the two cities agreed upon. He commenced the journey of nearly 6,000 miles on March 10, 1922, and since then has walked for over five months and completed over one-third of the distance. One of the important phases of the bet is that the dog must make the entire trip with him and if said dog passes away to the canine "hunting grounds" on the trip, then the wager is lost.

### TURKISH WOMEN ARE THREATENED

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 21.—Some optimistic and determined Turks are attempting to persuade the women of the city to adopt a standard form of dress. Optimistic, because Turkish women seem no more inclined to wear a uniform than would their sisters of London, Paris and New York, and determined because the Committee for the Reform of the Dress of the Women is thinking of calling upon the police for help in carrying out its plan.

"Where are the women who would consent to have imposed upon them an antique and strange costume found today only in museums?" is one of the questions hurled at the reformers.

"Where is the woman who would renounce such a costume to another? Can a Turkish woman of old world standard dress like a modern hand of aristocratic Paris? Nationalist fascists are an excellent thing, but only within limits."

The committee, in answer to these and similar other attacks, has announced that it is working on a plan to put over its project, the approval of which will be placed in the hands of the municipal police.

### MUCH LAVA IS DRAINED TO SEA

HILO, Island of Hawaii, T. H., July 21.—Recent volcanic activity in the ancient pits of Maunapu, Hama and Napua, which have been "dead" since 149, drained much of the lava that had made Halamaunou, the vast inner crater of Kilauea volcano, so spectacular and caused much fear that the lava would flow toward the sea, and inundate the little villages of Kalaupou, Panau and Puna.

Pele and Kama Puna had an argument and Kama Puna went to Halaunou, Pele's home, to fight it out. The god and goddess fought until Pele was overcome, and she pleaded for peace, according to the legend.

"We shall have peace if you promise never to allow your lava to flow through Puna or Hilo to these," Kama Puna said. Pele assented and she has never broken the promise, saving a return of the later Mauna Pele, the legend said.

In 1860, when a lava flow was proceeding toward Hilo and threatened to destroy the city, the Princess Ruth came from Honolulu here, and standing near the flow reminded Pele of her promise and her danger from Kama Puna, if she broke the agreement. The flow stopped immediately according to the older Hawaiians.

On several other occasions Pele has sent her red hot rivers in the direction of Puna and Hilo but they have never reached the two places.

The last activity, resulting from an underground flow from Halemaunou that broke out at Maunapu, eleven miles down the great southeast rift that leads from Kilauea, has changed the appearance of Kilauea, Hawaii's greatest scenic attraction, tremendously, according to persons now at the crater.

It is now possible during favorable wind shifts to reach close to the pit rim in what was known as Pele's oven.

Although the pit of Kilauea shows no activity, volcano observers say that "she is not dead, only sleeping." They base this prophecy on the fact that the tremors, which brought the underground lava flow, have ceased and that steam no longer is rising through north crevices along the rift line under which the lava was flowing. This would indicate that the underground flow has been stopped and that the lava will return to the Kilauea pit according to L. W. de Vis Norbin, secretary of the Hawaiian Volcano Research association.

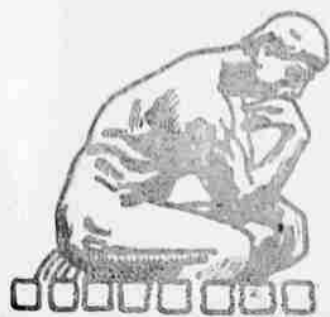
