

SULTAN INVADES TRANSJORDANIA

JERUSALEM, July 22.—The Transjordanian country has been invaded by the Sultan, ruler of Syria and leader of the powerful Wahabi tribe. Sultan has ordered his troops against Abdullah, Emir of Transjordan, and in the last of 10,000 well-armed Arabs he is with in four hours north of Amman, the capital of Transjordan. Sultan is moving to the north and is warning the latter not to resist, and it has added material to the influence of Abdullah in the hands of the Sultan. It has brought to light what is believed to be a secret treaty concluded with these forces and the Sultan and representatives of the Emir Abdullah.

Emir Abdullah declared as soon as the news of this invasion by the Wahabis, whose headquarters are in the central part of the Arabian peninsula, and in two days sent a delegation to Amman to negotiate peace, and ordered the British government to the British state in Amman. 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
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
