

# ARGENTINE BOY GIVEN HONORS

(By Associated Press.)  
 BOSTON, July 27.—A parallel to the Rhodes scholarships is seen in the establishment, through the Associated Harvard Club, of scholarships for the coming year to send to Harvard one boy from Argentina and one from Mexico. The scholarships have been made available through the generosity of members of the Harvard Club of New York, and they will be awarded respectively by the Harvard Club of Buenos Aires and the Harvard Club of Mexico City.

The Harvard men at Buenos Aires already have selected their scholar-ship holder. One of the members found recently in the country of the northern part of Argentina, which is devoted partly to sugar plantations, two young brothers of English descent named Beale, one of whom was 19 years old and the other 17. The older Beale had made a moving picture camera out of the crude material that he could pick up locally and then had made for himself a projector. It is said that the pictures produced were just as good as those shown in any cinema house in Argentina.

The younger Beale had become interested in locomotives. He saw in an English engineering magazine a picture of two Mogul locomotives of a type he used in Argentina. When he was 15 years old he started out to make the necessary machinery to make the parts for these locomotives. He built a lathe and a small furnace by which he cast and machined the cylinders and the other parts. Now he has two working models of Mogul locomotives, built entirely from the pictures in the magazine, each six feet long, and he has made them run under their own power.

The older Beale boy is to be awarded one of the new Harvard scholarships, and plans to enter Harvard this autumn. He will probably register in the Engineering School.

The scholarship contributed to the Harvard Club of Mexico City by the Associated Harvard Clubs is described by the secretary of that body as "only a small token of our appreciation and desire to reciprocate for the service done by the National University of Mexico in arranging for free summer courses for American students and teachers."

# MILLIONAIRE GETS UP EARLY

 LONDON, July 27.—American ownership of three-fourths of the gold in the world is not as great an asset in competition among nations as is the Yankee habit of early rising, in the opinion of Lord Leverhulme, the English peer who has made millions in the soap industry.

In an informal address at Bolton recently the well-known soap maker spoke of his recent trip to the United States where people, he declared, are forming better habits of industry than in England.

"If I am in an English hotel," said Lord Leverhulme, "and in order to catch an early train, getting my breakfast at 7 o'clock, I am handed over to a night watchman who gives me some cold stuff said to be from New York hotels and in full swing at that hour and I can get a good, hot breakfast in the dining room."

Lord Leverhulme also told his countrymen that in America young men do not consider work degrading, as do some English youths who are assured of legacies. "If in these English habits which are a danger and which will count in the competition among nations," Lord Leverhulme asserted.

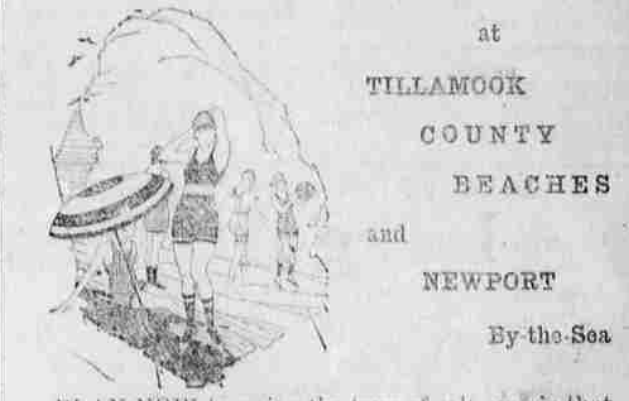


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**FILES WATER APPLICATION**

The little village of Tostedt, being short of funds, issued 10,000 pieces of paper money ranging from 50-pennig notes upward.
