COMING TO SHERRY'S SUNDAY AND MONDAY.

"The Trap Traced One of the Year's Best Films."

The metropolitan press has unqualifiedly termed "The Trap," Lon Chaney's Universal-Jewel starring feature, one of the best pictures of the year. As Gaspard the Good, who hides beneath a smiling exterior the heart of a wolf, Chaney does some of the most notable work of his career and carries the suspense of the story right up to the last reel, where a fight with a starving timber wolf furnishes the big moment of the play. "Thou shalt not kill," warns the village priest and Gaspard obeys the letter of his teachings, but for seven years he brings ill luck on the pair that betrayed him. Gaspard adopts the infant son of Benson, his hated enemy, after he has engineered a plot to put the latter in the penitentiary. He plans to take his final revenge on the baby's charms. The climax of the story comes with a suddenness and with a dramatic intensity that will thrill even those that imagine themselves thrill-proof. The role of Thalie is played by Darrin Godowsky, daughter of the world famous pianist, and in private life the wife of Frank Mayo. Others in the cast include Irene Rich, Alan Hale, Spottiswoode Aitken, Herbert Standing, Stanley Goethals, and Frank Campan. Robert Thornby directed this Universal-Jewel feature which was photographed against a scenic background of imposing beauty in Yosemite.

AN EPIC OF NEW YORK'S EAST SIDE IS "JUST AROUND THE CORNER."

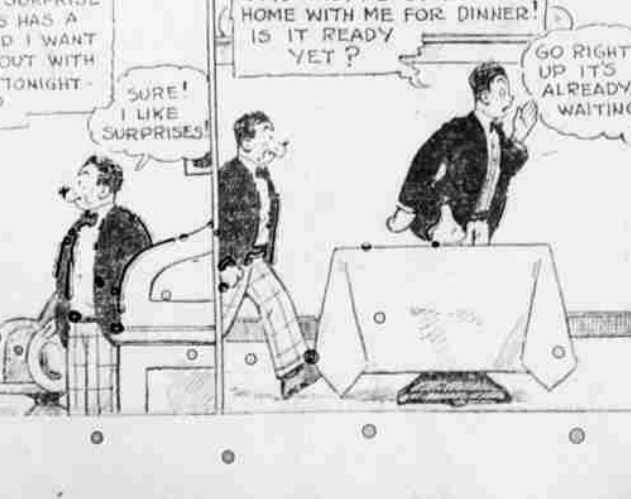
Following the great success made by "Humoresque," a Cosmopolitan production released by Paramount, comes another screen epic of the East Side of New York in "Just Around the Corner." THOUSANDS OF COYOTES KILLED
The harvest of predatory animals in this state has been altogether satisfactory this fiscal year, ending June 30, states the report of Stanley G. Jewett, inspector of the biological survey. Coyotes numbering 2377, 368 bobcats, 3 timber wolves and 25 stock-killing leopards have been either trapped, shot or poisoned by the government workers in co-operation with state and county officials during the past year. It is thought by the inspector that more were poisoned than were recovered. Not more than one coyote out of four is thought to have been recovered by the operators. The bulk of the work for the year was carried on in the eastern Oregon livestock owner range country in conjunction with agents furnished by the wool growers' association. The woolgrowers have estimated that the work of the year has saved them \$140,000 when the damage that a coyote does in his lifetime is rated at \$50. Financial co-operation has been received by the state sanitary livestock board and the county courts of Morrow, Wasco and Coos counties. The greatest hindrance to effective work by the government agents has been the private bounty hunter who would spring and unload government traps to save the coyote for himself during the fur season. Efforts have been made to revoke the bounties in some counties near the state lines. Hunters in other states have made practice of bringing their skins into Oregon counties to secure the greater bounty offered. It is felt by the biological survey that with greater financial appropriation by the state for salaried trappers and poison agents, effective

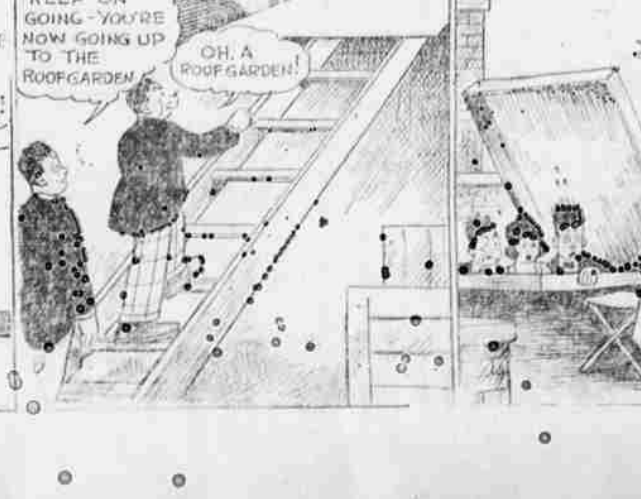
