# WOMAN LIKENED TO ELEPHANT

### Chicago Professor Sees Resemblance Between The Two; Explains His Ideas.

CHICAGO.—"Society finds that it has a new elephant on its hands."  
"And the elephant is?"  
"Yes, it's woman! And between this Scylla, woman, and Charibdis, labor, society tries to shove its hapless into a calm sea. But our social sea must always be agitated, mustn't it?"  
Two characters from a book written by Professor George A. Dorsey are talking about love and marriage. Friends of Professor Dorsey, former curator of anthropology at the Field Museum and professor at the University of Chicago, whose wife secured a divorce recently because of her husband's theories that writing and matrimony did not go together, were studying the first published novel of the "bohemian" professor today and discovering many of his theories of love and marriage between the pages of "Young Love," published in 1917, three years after he separated from his wife for a four-year period.

"Young Love" is one of the autobiographical novels as popular as literature recently. The experiences of the young man in the book are strikingly similar to the life of Professor Dorsey, friends point out. The hero of the novel takes a long tour through the Andes on a scientific expedition. Among the fictional romantic incidents in the book, many bits of philosophy are dropped by the characters. "You see, mon ami," the woman

Young Love lives says to him in one passage in the book, "the woman and labor problem is rooted in property rights and inheritance laws. We will compete with you as far as our strength permits. You can't keep us from doing that. But we can't be economically independent and beggar men at the same time. The time and strength required to bear children handicap us in the economic race. It always will."

Her Philosophy of Love.  
Perhaps Professor Dorsey will reflect on this message from his book as he contemplates the sliding scale of matrimony asked by his wife, who has borne him two children, readers of the book declare.  
An old philosopher in the book speaks to Young Love as follows:  
"There are several kinds of love. All of them combined don't constitute the whole of life—only a part of it."  
"Man at least has the courage to dare to question the doctrine of monogamy. He doubts by nature that he is polygamous. Do you suppose for a moment that woman's nature is radically different."  
"Of course. Modern marriage is generally such insurance."

### GERMANS COMPENSATED

# DONATIONS ONLY HOPE FOR MANY

SAMBOUR, Asia Minor, July 28.—American charity is keeping alive the remnant of the dying Armenian nation. When all other countries turned a deaf ear to the privations and horrors of the Armenian population, the American people donated \$50,000,000 and 300,000,000 pounds of foodstuffs and relief supplies. Centered throughout what was once the Armenian state are today more than 300 American men and women who are working valiantly to save the last vestiges of this oldest of Christian races in this far-off continent.

The Americans are concentrating their attention on the legions of parentless children which make Armenia the largest orphanage center the world has ever known. In Transcaucasia alone are gathered the childhood of 400,000 Armenian orphans who fled before the Turkish (Armenian, Trebizond, Van and Hittite). America has become the foster-parent of these unhappy, shelterless youngsters.

The Americans have organized 33 hospitals, 59 clinics, and numerous relief stations throughout Asia Minor. In a single month they have medical treatment to more than 100,000 patients. In the Alexandropol orphanage alone there are more than 3,000 children suffering from trachoma.

Charles V. Vickery, head of the American Near East Relief Committee, who recently arrived from the United States to supervise the field work of the organization, said recently in an interview:  
"We are caring for Armenia's and Greece's great hosts of refugees, orphans and sick in Northern Asia. It is a colossal task, made possible only by the liberality of the American people. But we cannot continue it indefinitely. We must make the people self-supporting. We are trying to place full responsibility for the care of the refugee population upon the governments concerned. The unfortunate fact, however, is that the governments are reluctant to accept the obligation. America's heart is the only one that seems to have been moved by the deplorable plight of these wretched people."

# SAN FRANCISCO MEETING PLACE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 28.—Lawyers and judges to the number of more than 2,000 are expected to come to San Francisco early in August to attend the 1922 convention of the American Bar association, the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws and the annual meeting of the California State Bar association. The commissioners meet August 2 to 5, the state body convenes August 7 and the national association on August 8 to 12.

Several noted speakers are to address the organizations, names on the program including William Howard Taft, chief justice of the United States; Vice President Calvin Coolidge; Chief Justice Lucien Shaw of the California supreme court; George W. Wickersham, former attorney general; Cordell A. Severance, president of the American Bar association; and Governor Henry J. Allen of Kansas. It is hoped that Elmer Root, former secretary at state, also will speak.

Addresses are also to be made by two distinguished visitors, the Rt. Hon. Lord Shaw of Dunfermline, representing the bar of Great Britain and M. Henri Aubagnin, representing the bar of Paris.

Two committee reports, in which a great deal of interest is being taken, will be presented. One is the report of the committee on promotion of American ideals, which will be presented by Martin L. Watts of Iowa. The other is the report of the committee on law enforcement, presented by W. B. Swann of Tennessee.

### DOCTOR VOICES GREAT DESPAIR

LONDON, July 28.—Pathetic letters are received here every day from prominent Russians in Moscow and other large Soviet centers depicting the plight of the population under the present regime. Writing to one of the London newspapers Professor Christovitch, an eminent physician, says that everyone is anxious to come to Europe or America to see how human beings live.

"We are living in a life of leas'te," says the letter "and we think only of wood and food. We are cut off from all civilized life and sympathizing people. You cannot, perhaps, understand how heavy life is without intellectual impressions, without books and newspapers and friendly conversations."

"Our hearts are so hardened by sufferings and losses that deaths of friends and relations make no more impression upon us than trivial events. Nevertheless we continue to hope to be human beings again! In the old Czarist days my wife and I longed for political freedom. Today my wife's ideal is to have a pair of stockings at 2,000,000 rubles a pair.

### ORCHESTRA TO BE DISSOLVED

SYDNEY, N. S. W., July 28.—Announcement of the impending dissolution of the state orchestra has thrown the New South Wales musical world into consternation. The government has given the musicians three months notice following the announcement that the deficit last year amounted to approximately \$20,000 and that the annual expenses were more than \$150,000. The plea of music lovers to the government asking a reconsideration of the decision to abolish the orchestra have been unavailing thus far.

### GANDHI HAS A SUCCESSOR NOW

CANNONFORD, India, July 28.—Maulana Haqit Mohani, who, in some quarters at least, has succeeded Mahatma Gandhi in the active leadership of Indian nationalists, has had a wide experience in the promotion of Indian movements. Unlike Gandhi, who is a Hindu, Mohani is a Mohammedan. He is now president of the United Provinces Provincial Congress Committee and was recently elected president of the All-India Muslim League.

In 1904, Mohani received the degree of Bachelor of Arts from Sir Syed Ahmad Khan, Mohammedan College. His first political venture was the establishment of a Mohammedan newspaper, printed in the Urdu language. This paper, called Urdu-a-maalla, did much toward assisting and uniting the Mohammedan community. From this time he began attending the annual meetings of the Indian National Congress and publishing in Urdu reports of the proceedings.

In 1908, Mohani was charged with sedition on account of an editorial which appeared in his paper on the English policy in Egypt. Although this had been written by a student in Aligarh College, the editor was held responsible for it and was sentenced to two years imprisonment and a fine of 500 rupees.

Upon being released from jail, he started his newspaper again, and also opened a store where Indian products were sold. At first, he was compelled to work under great financial difficulties. Subsequently his paper was again stopped by the government, and he started another.

On several occasions, restraints have been imposed on Mohani by the government, but the last of these were removed last November. He now has a large following among Indian nationalists, in spite of the fact that on some occasions he has opposed, not only Lord Reading's government, but Gandhi as well. By his opposition to Parildah (the confinement of women) he has drawn on his head the opposition of some of the more orthodox Mohammedans.
