"THE CAVE GIRL" AN UNUSUAL OUTDOOR FILM

Something unique in the way of scenic backgrounds makes its appearance in "The Cave Girl," the picture produced by Inspiration Pictures, Inc., which is showing at the Star Theatre today and Saturday.
