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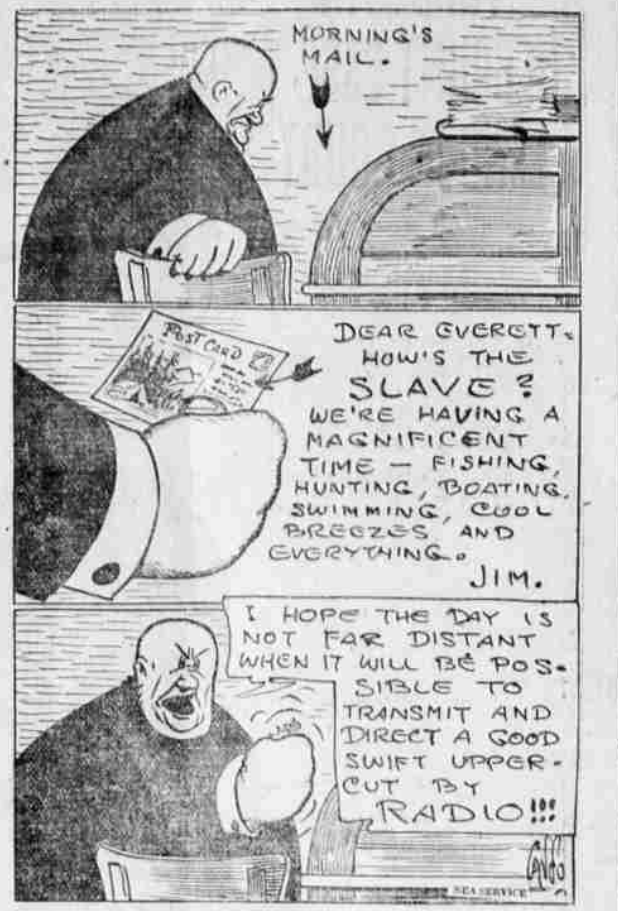

LUMBER DEMAND IS PICKING UP

In its weekly review of the lumber market, the American Lumberman says: While the demand for lumber is picking up and the market is stronger than it was two weeks ago, the railroad situation and the fuel shortage are causing some uneasiness. Both buyers and sellers of lumber are in the main agreed that there is going to be a severe car shortage. In fact, in some sections and particularly in the south, lumber shippers are unable to secure all the cars they need. It does not seem to be so much of a shortage of equipment as of fuel which has prevented the railroads from moving empty equipment to points where it is needed. Increasing demand from the country and a better tone in the industrial market make up for slackness in building in some of the large cities. Unsold stocks remain small and production has shown some decrease. A number of buyers are putting off purchases temporarily, although admitting that the lumber will be needed badly in sixty to ninety days. The lumber trade holds that this policy is unwise, inasmuch as, once the coal strike is settled, all available cars will have to be employed for coal shipments, which, with the movement of farm products, is believed to be sure to cause very considerable difficulty in getting lumber shipments through. A great many retail lumbermen handle coal and

Free Bridges Secured by Umatilla County

PENDLETON, July 31.—Umatilla county has secured through the good offices of J. C. Kuhns, forest supervisor of the Umatilla national forest, three new steel bridges from the national government to be used with road construction work. Two of the bridges are 78-foot spans, and will be used as a feed within the city limits of Pilot Rock. With the two larger bridges, the county gets \$100 each and \$50 for the smaller span. Freight charges must be paid by the county.

The bridges were constructed for war purposes and are now turned over to the forestry department for road building. Liberty trucks, belonging to the United States government are free to this county also except for freight charges.
