While "Evidence" may be classed as a "society play" those of us who have no sympathy for "class and caste" in our democracy will be highly entertained by the acting and delighted through the victory achieved through individual cleverness on the part of the character Miss Hammerstein represents. "Evidence" is fine screen entertainment, and Miss Hammerstein's popularity will be greatly enhanced thereby.
