CAN STAR APPEARS IN "MAN FROM HELL'S RIVER."

The Star Theatre offers a rare treat for followers of the silent drama in its presentation of "Man From Hell's River," written by James Oliver Curwood, and which will be shown at the Star Theatre today, Saturday and Sunday.

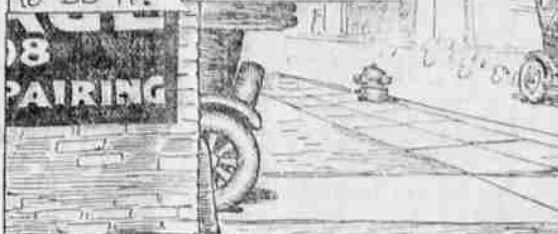

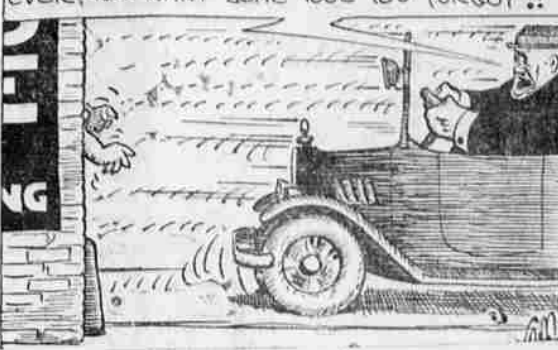

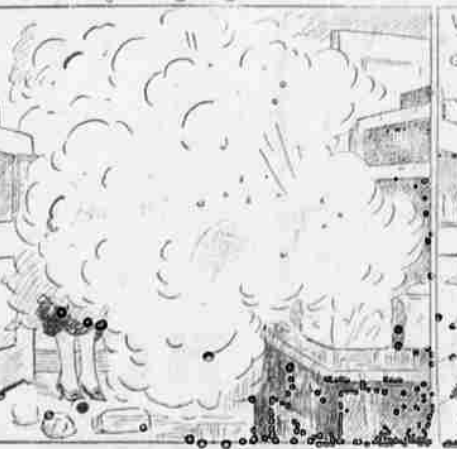
