More Wine Than Used in California; Stocks Continue to Enlarge

(By Associated Press)
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—Wine is being produced in California faster than the beverage is consumed and about five times as much has been made the last year as has been withdrawn from bond, according to John McLaughlin, collector of internal revenue.

In the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, the production of wine in the northern half of the state exceeded withdrawals by 2,877,490 gallons, his report shows. On July 1, 1922, there was on hand in the bonded wineries of the northern part of California 4,613,429 gallons.
