ANOTHER WORLD ALLIANCE MEET

Clergymen Think They Make Mankind Into One Brotherhood, is Report.

(By Associated Press)
COPENHAGEN, Aug. 7.—Clergymen and religious workers from all parts of the world will gather here early next month to attend the meeting of the international committee of the world alliance for international friendship through the churches, which will open August 7 and continue through August 11. One of the main topics will be the limitation of armaments and it is expected that the conference will adopt resolutions appealing to the nations of the world and recommending to the churches methods of cooperative work toward this end. Among the more than one hundred delegates representing the 29 national churches of the world alliance who are coming will be a large number of prominent American ministers, including Dr. No. 10,000,000 employees are insured under the German Invalidity Insurance system and 1,600,000 under the Private Employees Insurance. The Sickness Insurance grants to workmen, domestic servants and clerks, whose annual earnings do not exceed a certain limit, cash payments and benefits in kind. Charles S. Mackintosh, general secretary of the federal council of Churches of Christ, Dr. Arthur J. Brown, secretary of the Presbyterian Missionary Society; President W. H. P. Francis of Brown University; Professor William L. Hall of Swarthmore college; Hamilton Holt, of New York; Dr. Frederick Lynch, Mr. George A. Plimpton, the Rev. A. Z. Cline, the Rev. Laurita L. Lewis, Dr. Samuel A. Elliot, Dr. Anson P. Atterbury and Mr. John Harvey Moore Internationalism. Dr. Boynton, who is chairman of the international committee, will preside. A report on the Washington conference for limitation of armaments will be presented by Professor Hall, and the meeting will consider resolutions adopted at the seventh annual meeting of the world alliance, held last May in Cleveland, Ohio, which urged the United States government to participate in the court of international justice, favored the progressive reduction of armaments, and called upon the American people to cultivate and practice the art of thinking in terms of peace and international good will and to "find and apply the peaceful methods of settling international differences with honor and credit by the exchange of Labor Report to be Made. The results of a study of labor conditions in the United States, Great Britain, France, Germany, Denmark, Hungary, Austria, Holland and Serbia will be reported by nine committees appointed last January for this purpose, and the committee will analyze will be brought to the attention of the national governments concerned. On the basis of these recommendations the churches of the world will be asked to do their part in reconstructing the industrial order. One session will be devoted to a

discussion of racial and religious minorities, and how the churches may help in preserving the rights and liberties of such minorities. The American delegate will present a resolution, adopted at the Cleveland meeting, which urges the government of the United States to negotiate with Great Britain, or any other nation or nations, in investigating atrocities practiced on Christians of the Near East. The discussion will be carried on in English, French, German and Danish, and the proceedings of the conference will be published in these four languages.

COSTLY TO GREAT BRITAIN
(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Aug. 7.—Great Britain has paid out \$2,990,000 pounds under the unemployment insurance act since November, 1920. This statement was made recently by Sir Montague Barlow, parliamentary secretary of the ministry of labor, who said also that the ministry intended to press the question of insurance by industry and had appointed a committee to investigate the matter. A possible solution of the problem would be a compulsory state scheme to provide a minimum of benefits for everyone, and to form a basis on which individual industries could build special schemes according to their own requirements.

DOCTOR BILLS HIGHER LATELY

BERLIN, Aug. 7.—Medical treatment costs 20 times more in Germany today than it did before the war, declares Dr. Heinrich Braun, German minister of labor, writing in the current number of Reconstruction. Dr. Braun calls attention to this increase in connection with the critical situation which, he says, prevails in Germany's social insurance.

Although so far the directors of the sick funds have been successful in maintaining the payment of the benefits, the funds are "approaching their day of fate."

Medicines cost, on an average, 25 times the pre-war figure, while in 1914 a charge of three marks was made for a day's hospital treatment, which now costs 100 marks. According to the minister's statistics, 16,000,000 employees are insured under the German Invalidity Insurance system and 1,600,000 under the Private Employees Insurance.

The Sickness Insurance grants to workmen, domestic servants and clerks, whose annual earnings do not exceed a certain limit, cash payments and benefits in kind. The funds responsible for the payment of these benefits are kept up by the contributions of the insured persons and of the employers.

MODERN THINGS NOW IN NORTH

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Aug. 7.—An evidence of the rapidity with which events are transpiring in Alaska occurred Sunday afternoon, July 9, when an airplane bearing passengers passed over the city while ascending to the hills a pack train followed by several prospectors bearing packs upon their backs and with dogs likewise burdened headed for the hills. In the railroad yards a Pullman train was just pulling in and a big army type tractor was making its way out the Eagle river road to perform service for the Alaska road commission.

Tennis players halted for a moment to gaze at the airplane while watchers at a baseball game took a hasty glance but did not suffer their attention to be drawn from the national game. Out over the brink arm the airplane soared, thence on down to Cook inlet and back along the skirts of the mountain. Two old timers chewed assiduously upon their quids and cast a eye skyward. "Gee, Phil, if we'd had that thing filled with bacon and beans in '08," said one. "Some day I'm going to take a spin in that wagon just for luck," said the other. Cook inlet is rapidly being dotted with canneries and salteries beluga whaling stations and halibut fisheries. The airplane, introduced this summer by O. E. Hammett, will serve as the rapid transit between the canneries and Anchorage. Already the demand for services is growing and before the summer is ended regular schedules will be inaugurated. The city of Anchorage is working on plans for providing an aviation field, and the plans suggested for a permanent military post at Point Campbell, 10 miles south of Anchorage, carry with them an aviation field.

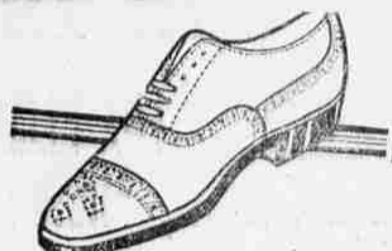
