WILLIAM FOX SENDING BIGGEST PRODUCTION HERE.

"Queen of Sheba," a William Fox super-special, which enjoyed a sensational run in Broadway, New York, is booked for the Arcade Theatre beginning Thursday. It is described as a stupendous spectacle and a great love story. New York critics hailed it as one of the greatest photodramas ever produced. It showed to crowded houses throughout the run, until taken off to make way for another of the Fox specials.

It is declared that the regency of "Queen of Sheba" is unsurpassed for magnificence on the screen, and that few such thrilling spectacles as the chariot race ever have been presented in motion pictures.

UNDERWORLD FILM PENNED BY "LIFER"

When Louis Victor Eyttinge, son of a good family, walked into the Arizona state penitentiary to begin serving a life sentence, he could hardly walk. He had a deep, wracking cough, emaciated frame and all the final stages of tuberculosis.

"Not over a month," said the prison physician, "He may not last that long." But he has lived; he has served fourteen years of that life sentence, breaking the monotony of a bleak life by studying and writing. His first and literary achievement to be put into picture form is to be shown on the screen of the Arcade Theatre Wednesday only as a Universal special attraction starring Herbert Rawlinson. It is "The Man Under Cover," and it was filmed at Universal City by Tud Browning, the director of that noted screen success, "Outside the Law."

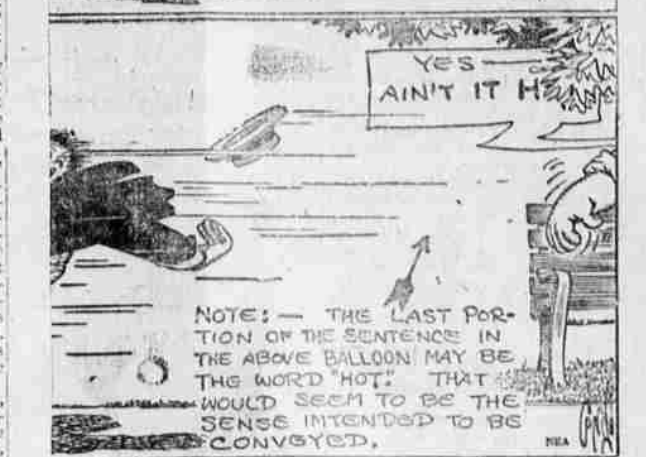
A two-reel comedy will also be shown. AT SHERRY'S PAULINE FREDERICK IN "THE GLORY OF CLEMENTINA."

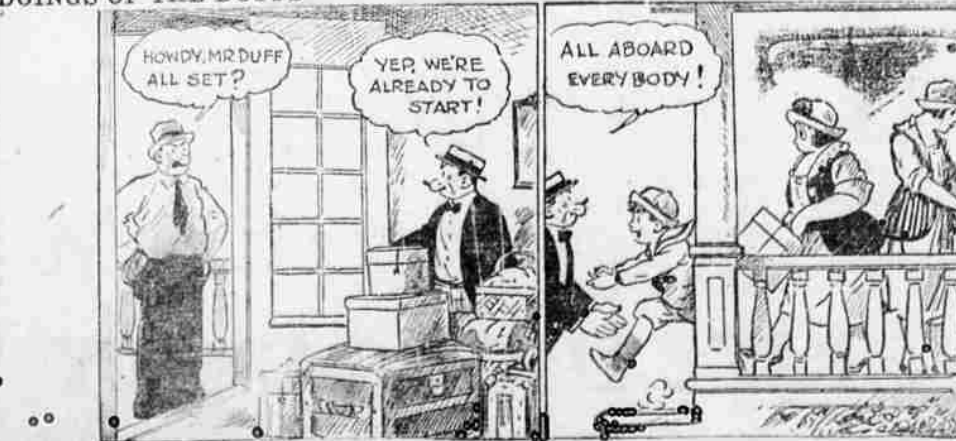
