WEEVIL SHOWS IN BAKER ALFALFA

Plans Being Laid to Make a Vigorous Fight on Pest that has Ruined Idaho.

BAKER, Aug. 8.—Investigation of the appearance of the alfalfa weevil in Baker county has shown there is urgent need of energetic action to prevent the spread and hold down the pest.

Mr. Campbell today showed a clod of dirt he had found on which there were hundreds of the weevil eggs, each of which would hatch out a worm which in turn feeds on the alfalfa.

Mr. Phillips, president of the Baker County Chamber of Commerce, who is also a large alfalfa grower, is also alarmed over the probability of the spread of the weevil and it is planned through the Chamber to arrange for a meeting of growers in Baker in the near future to discuss the situation.

William Pollman has also investigated the weevil condition and is convinced that action should be taken at once to curb the spread of the insect.

Dr. Blawell and party of Baker, passed through Medical Sunday on their way to West Eagle lakes.

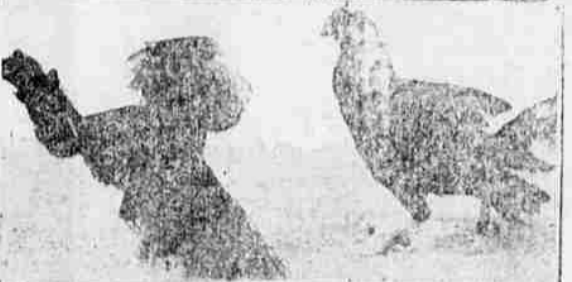

COOL WEATHER AT STARKEY

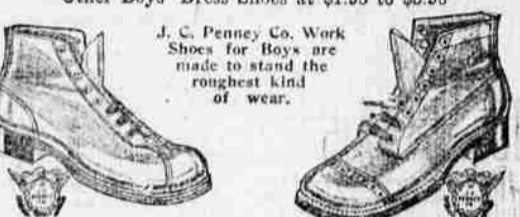
STARKEY, Aug. 8.—The hot weather is changing to cool and we had a fine rain Thursday night. It rained most all night.
