PLACE IN LEGEND AND HISTORY OF QUEEN OF SHEBA

The great part the Queen of Sheba played in the life of King Solomon is not only a matter of historical record, but also of Oriental legend, according to Virginia Tracy, author of the story on which "Queen of Sheba," the William Fox picture spectacle, which opens at the Arcade theatre Thursday, is based.

Throughout the east a hundred legends and traditions, mostly unwritten, keep alive the memory of the great queen who came from the south and won Solomon's heart. 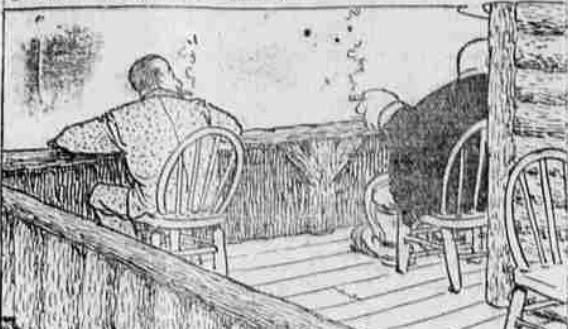

Mrs. Winter's class of the Methodist Sunday school had a weaver roast at the park on Tuesday evening.

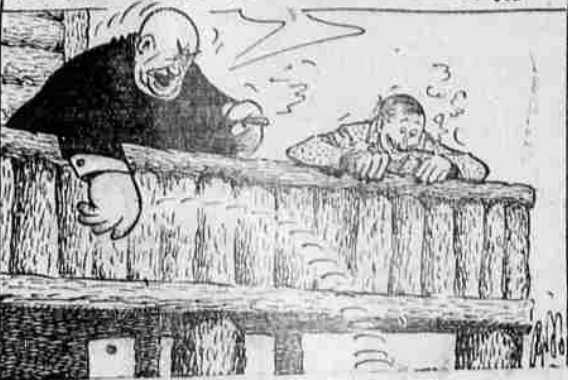

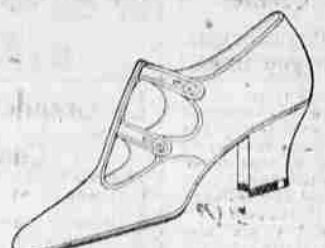
Several threatening outfits are now at work on Crick Flat. The what is yielding very well.
