Cove Was Disappointment. Cove was a disappointment to the rest of the league this year as was Union. Cove started the season by letting the Pirates win although she backed up and took six straight games afterwards. After leading the league easily for a while she cracked and both Baker and La Grande downed the "old guard." Union, last year's near champion, had a hard time keeping out of the cellar and failed to show anything at all during the first half of the season.

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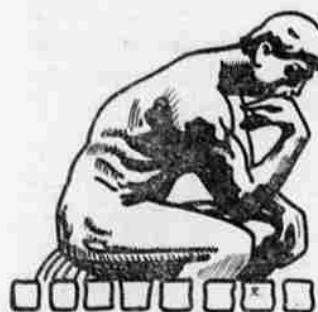
