

# ROUND-UP MAN DELIVERS BID

### Arthur Rudd, Booster for 1922 Pendleton Cowpuncher Classic, Spoke to La Grande Crowds Last Night.

Speaking before the entertainment committee of the La Grande Ad club and the Toole convention committee and before three theatre crowds, within one hour after he hit town, Arthur Rudd, "let 'er buck booster" for the Pendleton Round-Up and representative of the various civic organizations of the Umatilla metropolis, opened his second annual "whirlwind" publicity campaign in La Grande last night.

Mr. Rudd's work in La Grande is a part of a from "Denver to Portland" campaign in the interest of eastern Oregon's "biggest show in the world." Commenting on the attitude of the people of Utah, Colorado and Idaho, he said, "I find lots of red hot interest in the Round-Up as far west as Denver. All through the West people want to know about the Round-Up and many of them are planning to come. When they do come, La Grande as well as Pendleton will have a chance to show them its wares," he added.

In his talk before the committee the Pendletonian told of the rise of the Pendleton Round-Up as a municipal enterprise through 13 years and of the entering enterprise of the business men who annually make it the world's greatest epic drama of the west. "It is a great all-epic, Oregon production and we want you to feel that it is your show as well as ours," he declared.

The 13th annual Pendleton Round-Up will be held this year September 21, 22 and 23 with Tom Mix, 59 riders and 35 horses as a special feature of the presentation. "Tom and his outfit will stage some stunts and take some pictures, using the Round-Up as a setting," Rudd promised the theatre goers last night.

While here Rudd will visit neighboring communities and will take a jaunt up into the Wallowa valley, where he will spread the gospel of the cowpuncher classic in both written and oral form.

# RUSSELL FINDS LAW VIOLATORS

Although repeated warnings have been published and given in a personal way to people of all parts of the county Fire Warden L. H. Russell finds that some are inclined not to observe the laws relative to starting fires without proper permits during the dry season.

Yesterday he answered a call to the Looking Glass and found W. S. Brown, W. V. Binford and James Nicol engaged in burning brush and stumps contrary to the law. They were arrested and taken to Elgin where Justice of the Peace Wiles fined each man five dollars. "I don't want to work a hardship on anyone," said Mr. Russell today, "but the fire laws must be enforced because the stakes are too great to take any chances."

# Hunting Season May Be Closed.

So fearfully dry are the eastern Oregon forests that already it is understood Governor O'Connell has under consideration closing of the hunting season until a rain. State Forester F. A. Elliott has sent a communication to Mr. Russell saying that if weather conditions keep as they are it is very probable that the governor will close the hunting season before August 20th, which will prevent the rush of hunters to the hills when deer season opens. It is feared that many fires are caused by hunters.

# PENNSYLVANIAN HERE VISITING

"I am just beginning to realize the magnitude of the western part of the United States," remarked Edward Shillingford, who is visiting here with the Palmer connections in the Grande Ronde valley. He is a nephew of Mrs. Emma Hardin, Mrs. Lydia Grandy and Mrs. Beniah Newlin and this is his first time in the west. Mr. Shillingford is a resident of Philadelphia, Penn., and will be here for an indefinite period.

Accompanied by Sherwood Williams, he made a tour of the Grande Ronde valley yesterday and was amazed at the efficient manner of threshing and the average grain yield in this section. Stopping at a field where a combine was being used they inspected the machine and inquired from the owner how much he expected his field to yield.

"Only about 25 bushels per acre," was the reply with a dubious shake of the head. "Did he say only about 25 bushels?" queried Mr. Shillingford. "In the east 25 bushels would be a remarkable yield. The farmers there think they are doing well if they realize over 11 bushels per acre."

Mr. Shillingford is delighted with the west and it is possible that he may make the Grande Ronde valley his home.

# Million Dollar Fire Loss in July Outside of City of Portland

SALEM, Aug. 10.—Fire losses outside of Portland during the month of July aggregated \$972,565, according to the monthly report of A. C. Barber, state fire marshal. Fires causing losses of \$10,000 or more were:

- Astoria, hotel and contents, \$15,000; Blue River, hotel and contents, \$25,000; Bull Run station, sawmill and lumber mill, \$30,000; Corbett garage, hall and school, \$30,000; Eugene, gymnasium and art building at University of Oregon, \$50,000; Lane county, dairy barn, \$100,000; Marshfield, business buildings, \$200,500; Medford, laundry and contents, \$12,000; Multnomah county, lumber mill, \$30,000; Myrtle Point mill and lumber, \$10,000; Oregon City, business buildings, \$50,000; The Dalles, laundry and hotel, \$75,000; Washington county, mill, dwelling and contents, \$100,000; Wendling, mill, machinery and contents, \$200,000.

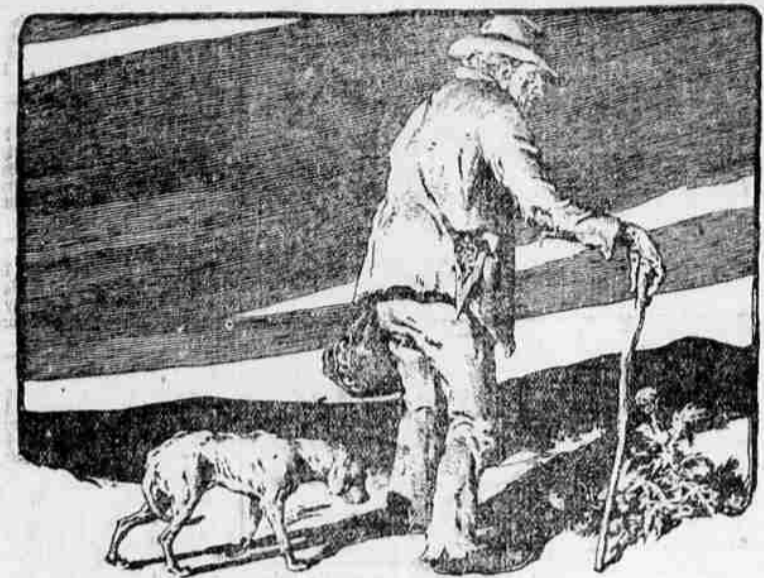

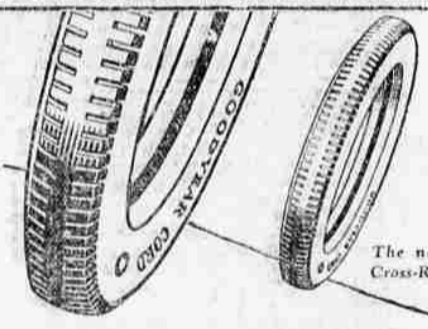
