Band Contests.

Chris Mays, who is in charge of the music and band contests reported that the competitive playing for \$50 cash prizes will be conducted at the fair grounds at which time the public is cordially invited. This will be at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Each contesting band will play one concert number the members seated, and one march number while the band passes in review before the grand stand.

W. D. McCarty, chairman of the ceremonial committee, reported that at the present moment it appears that the Lewiston Divan will exemplify the dramatic part of the initiation to be held Friday afternoon in the Rex hall.

Many Eating Places.

Claude Cooper, in charge of the eating facilities, reported that several of the churches and lodges and organizations were being lined up to care for this phase of the work. It being agreed that the present restaurant facilities will not be able to handle anything like half of the visiting crowds. The Dokie Finance Committee and the Ad club committee constitute the Finance Committee and they will hold a meeting Friday afternoon to organize for the campaign within the city. Members of the Dokie Temple which are scattered throughout eastern Oregon have been contributing liberally for the past few weeks. The agreement being that the lodge and its members would match what the business men of La Grande raise in the \$4,000 budget required to handle the convention.

The Housing Committee in charge of Glenn Forward has made a start and are preparing the way for a house to house canvass.

H. E. Dixon has care of the patrol contests and will pick the necessary judges and lay down the rules by which the temple patrols of the Northwest will compete for the liberal cash prizes.

Stunts To Be Fine.

C. K. McCormick, chairman of the Stunt Committee, reported that a bulk of the program is already provided and more is being added from time to time; 25 minutes of the program will be taken up by the Madrigal club and Philharmonic orchestra of Enterprise after which the program will take on a vaudeville tone.

It has been decided that no automobiles will be allowed in the enclosure in front of the grand stand at the ball park where the program will be presented. The cars will be parked in the area between the entrance gate and the grand stand. In addition to the 2,000 that can be seated in the grand stand temporary seats will be built on three sides of the platform in front of the grand stand on which the program will be presented. The public is cordially invited to attend those numbers, without price. Considerable space will be reserved in the grand stand for fez wearers and the official delegates of which there will be about 100, will have preferred seats in the space where the boxes used to be.

Cox Has the Parade.

Bruce Cox, chairman of the Parade Committee, was not present but the parade matter received considerable attention and as the situation now stands the line of march will be from Greenwood to Fourth street on Adams and from Adams to O street on Fourth, east of O to Sixth, north on Sixth to Washington and distant. The entire line of march will be cleared of automobiles except that autos can park at the intersections. A clean street is necessary because of the maneuvers which the patrol teams will go through during the progress of the parade. At present there are four sections of the parade with a band and drum corps for each section.

The reception and registration of guests is going to require the cooperation of a large number of people. J. H. Kewer is chairman of the reception committee which will receive the guests at the depot and at the parking space and direct all of them to the Y. M. C. A. where registration will take place and where souvenir badges will be issued. To those who want rooms the committees at the "Y" will make the reservations for them and the Boy Scouts will be in charge of the registration. The Y. M. C. A. will be in charge of the registration and the Club Clear Store and possibly at other points. At these

points the ordinary information that a visitor would need will be provided.

The decoration of the streets is about to begin and without a doubt will be the finest and most elaborate that any town outside of Portland within the state has ever attempted. Five blocks of Adams avenue and Depot streets from the depot to the Elks club will be converted into a Persian Street scene with a great quantity of palms and subdued lights and with a large number of flags and Dokie pennants, and that sort of a thing. A shrine will be built at the intersection of Adams and Depot. W. A. Richardson, formerly of Portland, who now lives here, has the contract for this work. The General Arrangements Committee of the Dokies is meeting twice a week and the various committees are in daily action.

Not only do the Ad club and Dokies recognize that this is the biggest convention undertaking that La Grande has outlined in its history, but that more depends on the successful convention than has ever been a fact. Recognizing these conditions everybody has his shoulder at the wheel.

One proposition coming before the meeting Friday will be the soliciting of entertainment funds among the merchants of La Grande in order that La Grande as a community may meet its full portion of the expense. The Dokie Temple and the members of it are assuming half of the burden. The total budget ranges close to \$4,500 of which about \$900 are prize moneys. The advertising campaign alone has cost about \$500. Newspaper articles and posters have been published in every town of any consequence in British Columbia, Alberta, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Idaho. W. A. Richardson, formerly of Portland, who now lives in La Grande, has just returned from Cheyenne and reports that the advertising posters are conspicuous through southern Idaho. Wm. Miller has just returned from sound cities and reports that all the sound countries are well provided with posters and that the papers throughout Washington are generous in their mention about the publicity that La Grande has received. C. L. Brill, of Walla Walla, who is president of the association that meets here, has just completed a trip through Spokane and northern Idaho country and finds newspaper and poster publicity has been generous. J. A. McCarthy is billing western Oregon. From Vancouver, B. C., from Lehigh, bridge, from Nelson, and from Victoria come letters this week saying that interest is keen there and that the official delegates from all those temples will be present. Copies of Canadian papers have been received and bearing generous publicity of the La Grande meeting. Giles Harnden is billing interior Oregon. It would be practically impossible to buy the advertising that La Grande has obtained because of the convention even before the convention convenes.

The various committees call for the attention of the merchants to the fact that on 4th of July celebrations there is no opportunity to keep stores open, while on this occasion business will continue to operate and the big delegations present must, of necessity, spend money freely as it is the case in all conventions. Thus a double benefit results to the city and puts an actual value on the entertainment funds that are posted.
