## DARKNESS DON'T AFFECT EYESIGHT

(By Associated Press.)  
HAZLETON, Pa., Aug. 11.—The coal mine mule, which ordinarily spends years of his life in the darkness of mine tunnels far underground, retains his eyesight even though he does not use his eyes.

So veterinarians in the anthracite region have determined following examination of many of the mules which have been brought to the surface since the mines closed down last spring. With this announcement the veterinarians exploded a theory held by many for years—that because he did not have any use for his eyes, the mule lost his sight.

The coal mine mule usually begins life like any common farm mule. Once he becomes a mine worker, however, things change. He is sent far underground into the dark workings of the hard coal mines and there he stays often for the remainder of his life. Being a hardy animal he sometimes remains in the mines for 20 years without seeing daylight.

When the mules were hoisted to the surface and turned loose upon the common properties some of them blinked a bit at the sunlight. When the veterinarians looked them over they found their eyes were there and as good as ever.

## TURKS MAY LOSE THEIR RUSSIANS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 11.—Turkey will be represented in the Olympic games of 1924 in Paris. The Associated Press was informed by Prince Eumer Farouk Effendi, son of the heir apparent and chairman of the Turkish Sports' Federation.

the congress finally supreme. It is the last resort its powers practical by would be unlimited. This would be to do away with the great main principle of our written constitution, which regards the people as sovereigns and the government as their agent, and would tend to make the legislative body sovereign and the people its subjects. It would to an extent, substitute for the will of the people, definitely and permanently expressed in their written constitution the changing and uncertain will of the congress. That would radically alter our form of government and take from it its chief guarantee of freedom.

Citing the child labor law decision, the vice president pointed out that "should the people desire to have the congress pass laws relating to that ever which they have not yet granted to it any jurisdiction, the way is open and plain to proceed" by amending the constitution.

Greater Understanding Needed. Citing the "growing multiplicity of laws," which he ascribed partly to "the increasing complexity of advancing civilization" and in part to "the attempt to raise the moral standard of society by legislation," he said the "spirit of reform is altogether encouraging" but "there needs to be understanding of the province of legislature and judicial action" and a "wide comprehension of the limitations of the law."

"There exists, and must always exist," he said, "the righteous authority of the state. That is the sole source of the liberty of the individual, but it does not mean an inquisitive and officious interference by attempted government action in all the affairs of the people. There is no justification for public interference with purely private concerns."

Mr. Coolidge compared the trend "for the better part of a century" during which "the early amendments were all in diminution of the power of the government and declaratory of an enlarged sovereignty of the people," and the movement "in the opposite direction" during "the past thirty years" from the interstate commerce act of the late eighties to the recently enacted maternity aid law.

"This has not been accomplished without what is virtually a change in the form, and actually a change in the process, of our government," he declared, adding that it had proceeded "on the theory that it would be for the public benefit to have government to a greater degree, the direct action of the people." To this change, he said, "some of the stabilizing safeguards" originally established "have been weakened" and "the representative element has been diminished and the democratic element has been increased, but it is still constitutional government."

"It is not sufficient to secure legislation for promoting general reform or reflecting the raising of the general standard of human relationship," he continued, "and leave it to go alone." A "renewed and enlarged determination to secure the observance and enforcement of the law, is required," he declared. "There can be no perfect control of personal conduct by national legislation," he added. "The people cannot divest themselves of their really great burdens by undertaking to provide that they shall hereafter be borne by the government."

## PASS SYSTEM ON STREET CARS

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 11.—Weekly street car passes are being tried out here by the local traction company for a four month period, and so far have been popular with patrons. The passes, which sell for \$1, are good for rides from Monday morning until the next Sunday night and are transferable to anyone. The single street car fare here is ten cents, or 12 tickets for \$1.

The street car company points out that every pass purchaser is certain to get more than 12 rides on his pass and it is figured the average number of riders on each is about 25. In the case of messengers or others who travel a great deal on street cars the passes are used so frequently that the fare actually is reduced to one cent a ride.

The system has been used in the middlewest, but never before on the Pacific Coast.

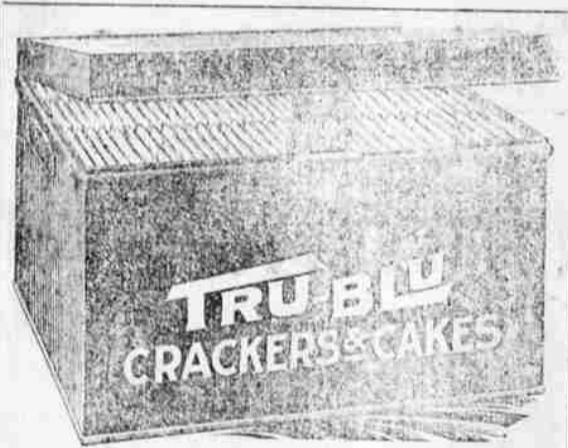

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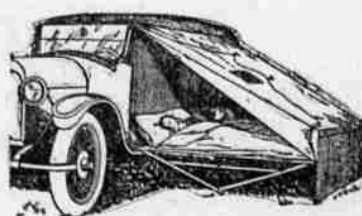
