Just Thirty Years Ago in the Grande Ronde Valley

August 12, 1892.

District Attorney Hyde and Sheriff Conde of Baker county, returned yesterday morning from Union, where they received the \$2500 reward for capturing the North Powder train robbers.

There is a large and general complaint over the exorbitant bills allowed in the small pox case. The bill for the past house, which cost the city \$400 in city warrants, is considered an outrage. More than one competent contractor in La Grande has stated that the house would be dedicated in every respect for \$250. The mayor of the city also complains in a charge of criticism in presenting an exorbitant bill, including \$50 for two suits of clothes.

Fred Nodine, the cattle king and big rancher of Union county, was away from his farm near Oatman Monday. Fred Prochelt was severely injured by a fall from his barn. Friday evening, while attempting to feed his stock he slipped and fell a distance of about twenty feet into the manger below, and the force of the fall was considerably increased by a sack of grain that tumbled on top of him. He managed to get to the barn and was assisted to bed. It was found that while no bones were broken the shock of the fall had caused a serious bruising about the chest and it was at first feared that the injury might be internal and possibly result seriously. He has been confined to his bed but it is thought he will soon be sufficiently recovered to be out again.

Wallowa County Court Sublets Road Contracts on the Entire Highway

ENTERPRISE, Aug. 12.—Three sublets were let last week by the county court for the construction of the seven miles of highway between Enterprise and W. W. Wade's farm. The county has shifted the burden of the work and will not engage in construction at all. The prices of the subcontracts appear to leave the county safe on its price of \$110,000 for the whole job.
Two whole days, from Wednesday to Friday noon were spent by Judge Marvin and Commissioners Johnson and McCully, weighing and dividing the various lots of subcontracts and the result was a clean-cut job, which is gratifying to all. Work on the bridges will be begun at once, and on the earth grade a beginning will be made in about a week. It is expected that the bridge will be finished this fall and the highway will be completed next spring.

The first two volumes of the "Outline of Science" are now in the County. Prof. Thomson of the University of Aberdeen plans to do in science what Wells has accomplished in the field of history; namely, to give the general reader, who takes an intelligent interest in the progress of science, a comprehensive but accurate survey of the field of scientific thought and discovery. The style is pleasantly clear and simple and free from technicalities. The first volume takes up the romance of the heavens and the story of evolution; the second is chiefly about natural history. There will be four volumes when the work is completed, the publication of each volume being set a month apart.

WALLOWA HIGH SCHOOL RISING

WALLOWA, Aug. 12.—Wallowa's new high school is rapidly assuming form. Twenty-three men are busy under contractor George Wade, who is rushing the work with his crew. The brick walls have risen about four feet above the cement foundation, and the central stalling is in place. The window frames have arrived and are being prepared for placing. They are of a pleasing arch design, and are of generous proportion. The window sills, which are to be of concrete, are being cast in the basement; fifteen wooden forms being used. The cast stone has arrived and a few blocks have been put in place near the main entrance. The Gothic ornamentation is very pleasing and will add the element of dignity and classic beauty which means so much in the beauty of an edifice. The foundation walls of the building have been raised about two feet so that the basement is really a ground floor, with full sized windows and ten foot ceilings.
The crew at work consists of four brick masons, six carpenters and thirteen helpers. Their pay ranges from \$2.50 to \$10.00 a day. There are also two steamfitters who are installing the pipes from the well constructed boiler in the east store.
C. Stantuff will arrive Friday to take Mr. Wade's place as manager, while the present popular manager will resume the office work in Portland.
