SONGS SUNG IN DYING LANGUAGE

(By Associated Press.) PAPEETE, Tahiti, July 15.—(By Mail)—Songs in a dying language, intelligible to half the singers themselves and to the greater number of the listeners, with dances of a bygone day, in the French South Sea colony of Tahiti, featured the native celebration July 14, commemorating the fall of the Bastille in Paris in 1789. Gaily dressed throngs attended the performances at which prizes were awarded to the competitors from the different districts. Some of the districts, their legends and even their language lost by the passing of the elders of the tribes, substituted European words and music for the ancient epics. The fête lasted for several days, singing and dancing being varied by canoe and horse races, athletic contests and illuminated night regattas on the harbor. This year's celebration of Bastille Day was preceded by an American ball on July 4, which proved that it is "made to become an annual event in Tahiti.

BOATS TO CARRY APPLE CROP

One Million Boxes of Inland Empire Apples Will be Shipped in Steamers to American and Foreign Ports.

(By Associated Press.) SEATTLE, Aug. 15.—Agreements have been made between the apple growers and the port of Seattle whereby one million boxes of this year's apple crop will move to American and foreign markets by steamers. Of the 1921 crop 375,000 boxes were shipped by boat and in 1922 only 2,000 boxes were handled over Seattle docks. The Washington state production of apples this year will be only a little less than last year when approximately a third of the commercial apples of the United States were grown in this state.

A surprising development in the apple industry is the rapid increase in the movement of this fruit on refrigerated boats. Until the last few years all the apples, peaches, strawberries and other fruits sent to outside markets moved on trains. In 1920 experimental shipments to Atlantic and European ports showed feasibility and economies of shipping fruit by rail to Seattle and then by intercoastal and trans-Atlantic boats of the great consuming centers of the Atlantic seaboard and Europe. Shipments arrived in the United Kingdom purchased a million and a half barrels of American apples in 1921. In such excellent shape that the bulk of the fruit moving from the Pacific Northwest to Continental Europe will go by boats from North Pacific ports. This year the apple crop in Europe will be short, and Washington growers expect to ship 300,000 boxes from this port to England.

Last year when the railroads refrigerated space for the movement of 32,541 carloads of Washington apples, the growers took advantage of the public cold storage space, enough for 20,000 tons here, and this year have contracted to ship at least three times as much through the local public terminals. Resulting in an intercoastal steamship with refrigeration left for the Atlantic seaboard with apples pears and peaches, loganberries, strawberries packed in sugar, reindeer meat from Alaska, frozen fish, eggs and poultry. En route south the vessel picked up California citrus fruits and other perishable products from the Golden State. Formerly all this tonnage moved to New York, Boston, Philadelphia and other centers by train.

Chinese are gradually learning to eat American apples and last year imported 4,500 barrels, while the Philippines took 11,026 barrels. The government's fast express service in the Far East has resulted in several tons of lettuce, celery and vegetables going forward on every boat and the American garden produce is eagerly bought up despite transportation charges.
