GERMAN PLANE BUILDERS REJECT BRITISH EFFORTS

English Are Unable to Secure German Airplane Builders to Aid in Establishing and Maintaining Aerial Service.

(By Associated Press)

BERLIN, July 24. By Mail.—English interests have failed recently in efforts to enlist the aid of Germany's three largest airplane constructors in the establishment and maintenance of an aerial service between England, Egypt, India and Australia, under British auspices, according to Director Johann Schutte of the Schutte-Lanz works.

Herr Schutte has recently returned from the U. S. after concluding negotiations for the founding of a German-American company to conduct a European-American air line.

The director intimated that the English project was launched in an attempt to divert the close connections which now have been established between American and German undertakings and to substitute for them a British leadership in

airship construction "which does not exist," he says.

According to Herr Schutte, British interests made proposals to three German companies looking to cooperative construction, but in each case the offer was declined.

Herr Schutte declined in the project an effort to reap the advantages of Germany's experience in airship construction with the object of ultimately taking over the German leadership in this department. He declared its frustration signified the impracticability of the entire plan. Asserting the English builders have repeatedly failed to produce satisfactory results, he declared the English now have at their disposal only two serviceable Zeppelins built for use in the war, and that the cell-bodies of these are no longer trust-worthy. These, he said, would not suffice even for a service between England and Egypt.

TIME IS MONEY BELIEVE JAPS

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—That "time is money" which must be saved is the purport of an edict recently issued by the Japanese war department at Tokyo, according to advices from the Japanese capital. The result of the order was to stop the firing of the noon gun. In order to continue the time-honored cannon bark in the city of Tokyo approximately 10,000, or about \$5,000 per year, to supply blank cartridges.

MUNICIPAL DANCE CLOSES 3 HALLS

Open Air Municipal Dance so Successful that Three Private Dance Halls Were Forced to Close in Pasadena.

PASADENA, Cal., Aug. 15.—A municipal open air dance so successful that three privately owned public dance halls were forced to close is attended by more than a thousand persons every Friday night at the Tournament of Roses park. The dance, held by the City of Pasadena, draws visitors from a dozen surrounding towns including many persons from Los Angeles, eleven miles distant.

The admission price, ten cents, is low enough that a family of five can dance all evening in the cool open air for a half dollar. And families do take advantage of the city supervised dance. Gray haired men and women, middle aged persons, rich people, poor people, flappers and even small children gather here and can be seen dancing old fashioned waltzes and the latest "jazz" steps in the two large tennis courts on which the dance is held.

During the two months that dances have been held at the park, not one person has been ordered from the park for improper conduct. Persons who haven't danced "for years," now never miss a Friday night at the park. At eleven o'clock the music stops and everyone must leave.

A large automobile park, operated by the city without charge to the dancers, is always filled to overflowing and while the dance is in progress the streets about the park for several blocks are lined with automobiles belonging to the dancers.

The floor, made smooth by applying a special chip, is claimed as suitable to dance on as any ballroom floor, while the music, furnished by an eight piece orchestra, is declared by the dancers, especially the youngsters, to be "jazzy."

CANNON BALLS FOUND IN WOODS

MINDEN, Nev., Aug. 15.—A discovery of cannon balls in the Mono National Forest where he expected to find gold led A. Ferguson, a prospector, to wonder what battle in American history had taken place there, but investigation proved that they were merely relics of General John C. Fremont's expedition to California in 1844.

Although not well versed in early California history, A. Ferguson, an ex-cavalry veteran, immediately recognized the character of two steel spheres he dug from the gravel in a small ravine not far from Fales Hot Springs in Mono county, California. They were "two-pounders," once a standard piece of ammunition in the American artillery, and only slightly rusted from their years of repose in the ground.

General Fremont's diary records that on January 28, 1844, he was obliged to abandon his howitzer at a point in Deep Creek, a canyon so precipitous that only men and mules could navigate it. This place is about eight miles north of where the cannon balls were discovered, so it is supposed General Fremont abandoned his howitzer ammunition as of no further use.

The relics were taken by Ranger Atcheson to headquarters of the Mono National Forest at Minden.

BAKER POLICE HAVE FAST RUN

F. L. Howard, alias N. Lewis, was arrested yesterday in Baker by the Baker police and was brought to La Grande last night where he was wanted for issuing two worthless checks on the United States National bank. Both checks were for \$5 and he passed them on Dan Baird, proprietor of the Darland apartments.

Howard is confined in the county jail and his arraignment will be held either late this afternoon or tomorrow. According to the Baker papers, the Baker police had a thrilling time catching the bad check artist. The following account describes their chase:

"A man giving the name of N. Lewis was arrested by the local police yesterday after a sensational race through the Willaville section of the city. The police received yesterday morning the description of a man wanted in La Grande for issuing two worthless checks. Shortly afterwards Officer George Pierce saw a man answering the description on the street corner of Main and Auburn and spoke to him.

"The action of the man aroused the suspicion of Pierce and after passing him he called to the man to stop, when he broke into a run. The chase was then on. Lewis ran out Bridge street across the bridge and then over a fence and through back yards along the river. Pierce fired three shots in the air for the man to stop, but he only went the faster. Pierce lost trace of him near the O.W. tracks.

"Lewis was arrested a few minutes later by Chief Walter Palmer and Officer O. M. Hand. Lewis had hid under a flume near the Sumpter Valley track, and gave up immediately he was discovered. Norman Henderson acted as chauffeur for the chief in running down Lewis."
