POPE DECIDES, PRIESTS OBEY

Pope Sends Monsignor Orsenigo to Hugue to Become Papal Internuncio; Monsignor Hesitated but Pontiff thought Otherwise.

ROME, July 30.—(By Mail).—Priests and soldiers receive orders and must obey them, were the words of the Pope in deciding the question who should become papal internuncio at Hugue. "You will be the right man in the right place," Monsignor Orsenigo bowed, and the matter was closed.
The monsignor had hesitated for conscientious reasons, not considering himself fitted to deal with the responsibilities of the position. But the Pontiff thought otherwise, and thus disposed of a problem which for some
