Arcade Theatre Monday.

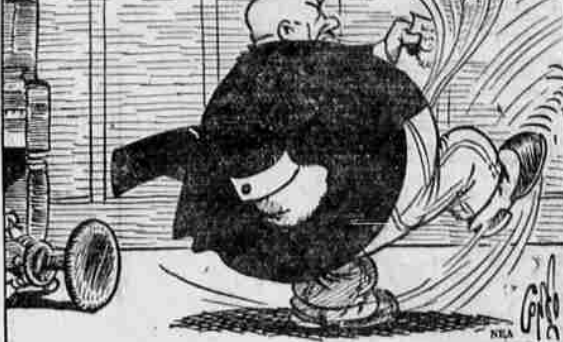
Miss Stewart appears to charming
