PLANS GOLD CUP REGATTA

Commodore Wood Says Annual Gold Cup Regatta Being Prepared; Also International Motor Boat Sweepstakes.

DETROIT, Aug. 23.—Plans are being shaped for the annual Gold Cup regatta, to be held here September 1 to 4, inclusive, and for the International Motor Boat Sweepstakes, the 150-mile runabout event for \$25,000 to be run September 2, next year. It is announced by Commodore Gar Wood, president of the Yachtman's Association of America. The International Sweepstakes event will bring to the winner the largest purse in the history of aquatic sport events. The boats entered must be runabouts limited to a maximum engine cylinder content of 1,350 cubic inches, a minimum length of 25 feet, and beam of five feet, and a passenger of not fewer than two. Commodore Wood announced selection of Commodore Frederick H. GREAT ENGINEERING.
