SOME ROADS MAY SETTLE INDIVIDUALLY

(Continued from Page One.)

The majority of the members of the association of railway executives and were satisfied with the stand previously taken by that body, against restoring strikers with full seniority rank.

Seniority Stand Reaffirmed. It was learned that the association meeting this morning had reaffirmed its stand on seniority. A committee meeting with the mediators then read this resolution and received two counter-proposals, after which the brotherhood men to the astonishment of the strikers, went before the association as a whole.

The first proposal, it was understood, was that the strikers be reinstated as of June 30, when the strike was called, without specific mention of seniority privileges.

The second was that roads so desiring make separate settlements with the strikers.

Mediators to Get Bid. It was the second proposition, it was reported, that attracted the attention of the group of executives from the west, said to constitute the minority, and that caused extended debate.

When the western executives adjourned, Hale Holden of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy issued a statement which he said would supplement the official statement to be issued later by R. S. Binkerd, assistant to T. De Witt Cuyler, head of the association.

At the conclusion of the general meeting of the association of railway executives, the officers of a considerable number of individual railroads remained in further conference over a proposition submitted by the brotherhood officials," said the statement.

"There was no dissent from the action taken at the main meeting."

Supplementing this statement verbally, Mr. Holden said:

"There is no question of split. The railroads are all standing pat on seniority and any individual settlement will have to be made in the light of the understanding."

Mr. Holden said about 25 attended the later meeting. He said no session had been set for today, but did not deny that the brotherhood officials might be received again.

WOMAN BURNED TO DEATH WHILE MAKING SOAP ON RANCH NEAR HALFWAY

HALFWAY, Ore., Aug. 24.—Mrs. W. A. Flower was burned to death Thursday while making soap on her husband's ranch near Halfway. When she stooped over the stove her clothing took fire. She tried to put out the fire by rolling on the ground, but on account of the rocky nature of the soil did not succeed.

Mr. Flower was working close by and heard her scream.

When he arrived she was at the pump trying to pump water over her body. Death followed in seven hours.

Mrs. Flower came to Oregon from Milwaukee, Wis., last spring to marry Mr. Flower. She had waited for years to be wedded, having cared for her aged parents.

HUNTING SEASON CLOSED BELOW

PORTLAND, Aug. 24.—Immediate closing of the hunting season for grouse and native pheasant in nine Willamette counties was today decided on by the game commissioners following protests from valley citizens against the wholesale killing of Chinese pheasants and other game birds during the past five days. The open season on grouse and pheasants was fixed simultaneously with the deer season opening, August 20, but as hunters have been killing Chinese pheasants, along with the native variety protests have resulted in issuing the closing order which only awaits the approval of Commissioner Bean.

FAILURE OF ANTI-VICE

Shanghai's Experiment of Anti-vice Gives Indication of Not Working; Wide-spread Discussion.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 24.—(By Mail)—Shanghai's experiment, begun some two years ago, to eliminate commercial vice from the International Settlement, has been occasioning widespread discussion in Shanghai and elsewhere by reason of recent official reports that seem to indicate the belief that the plan adopted will not work.

The scheme was proposed by a vice commission. When it was put into operation the 800-odd establishments of the International Settlement were licensed and the purpose has been to cancel one-fifth of the total number of houses each year for a period of five years—with the end that place of the kind would be wholly eliminated at the end of the five-year period.

After the scheme has been in operation two years its wisdom seemingly is questioned in the course of a report lately issued by the Municipal Council. This report says the evil and attendant evils "have in no way decreased but have merely spread over a much wider area with consequent impossibility of any effective police control."

This elicited a swift response from local "moral warfare" forces. The council was asked if its statement meant that the places closed open again in new quarters in the Settlement and operate unchecked and if the police feel them unable to cope with the situation.

Replying to these questions the Municipal Council said that places officially closed remain closed, but that nevertheless former occupants, having no other means of making a living, continue their former lives in private houses where they are in no sense subject to police control.
