Newspaper Man Heads Cranberry Growers of Pacific Coast Country

ASTORIA, Aug. 25.—The Pacific Cranberry exchange has just completed its incorporation as a co-operative agricultural association, organizing under the laws of the state of Washington, having its principal place of business at Ilwaco, Wash. The officers elected were: J. S. Dollinger, editor of the Astorian, president; E. W. Paul, vice president, and G. W. Hill, secretary.

The members composing the exchange are the cranberry growers of both sides of the Columbia river at its mouth. The growers of this district, which is the principal cranberry growing district of the Pacific Coast, have been doing business for several years under the name which is used by the new corporation.

Schimpff to Sell Crop. W. E. Schimpff, who has served as sales manager for the past year, has

again been selected by the growers to act in that capacity. This season will see a greater number of growers affiliated with the exchange than last season, and in consequence the exchange expects to market a greater proportion of the fruit than it did last season.

Last year the cranberry crop on the Pacific coast totaled 33,000 boxes. It is now a certainty that the crop will not be as large as that of last season. Picking will begin in two weeks. MOORE TO LEAD REPUBLICANS

State Convention in Idaho Names Ticket and Upholds its Plan of Selecting Candidates.

WALLACE, Ida., Aug. 25.—C. C. Moore, lieutenant-governor of the state of Idaho, is the standard bearer of the republican party of this state, having been nominated by acclamation for governor by the state convention which completed its work here Wednesday by placing before the voters a congressional, judicial and state ticket and adjourned sine die late in the afternoon. The entire ticket nominated was almost identical with the ticket forecast before the convention.

The nomination of Lieutenant-Governor Moore was the keynote event of the convention. Wild cheering broke from the throats of the delegates following his selection. He is one of the few gubernatorial candidates of the republican party in this state nominated spontaneously and by acclamation.

Both Representative Re-Chosen. The re-nomination of the present republican representatives in congress from the 1st and 2nd districts, Burton L. French and Addison T. Smith, was but a formality. William Lee of Moscow presented the name of French, and M. J. Sweeney of Twin Falls, the name of Smith. The unanimous vote of the convention was immediately recorded for them.

Nor was there more formality in the nomination of William Lee for justice of the supreme court. Frank Dean of Weiser, who had been spoken of as never candidate nor was Lee when the convention opened. The demand for Lee arose as the convention progressed and his unanimous nomination followed.

There were but two real contests in the nominations on the state ticket, for lieutenant-governor and superintendent of public instruction.

Convention System Indorsed. The fight for a state-wide primary plank for the nomination of all elective officers was lost in the convention shortly after it opened its session today, by a decisive vote of 171 to 31. Ada county's delegation of 20 championed the primary plank, making the fight for it before the resolutions committee and on the floor of the convention.

The issue was squarely put when C. C. Cavanaugh of Boise, Ada county's member of the resolutions committee, offered a minority plank to the platform declaring for the re-enactment of the primary law.

SALEM, Aug. 25.—Moral instruction in the Public Schools Through the Story, is the title of a pamphlet being distributed among county school superintendents of the state by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent. For each one of the elementary grades stories are listed on the virtues of cleanliness, punctuality, truthfulness, respect and reverence, courtesy and politeness, honesty, kindness, patriotism, courage, industry and obedience.

The pamphlet urges the teachers to read or tell the stories to the pupils. Under each virtue a number of books are listed that may be obtained from the Oregon state library.

INSPECTION LAW WANTED.

SALEM, Aug. 25.—Legislation to provide for adequate inspection of fruits and vegetables shipped out of Oregon doubtless will be introduced at the next session of the state legislature, it was announced by C. A. Park of Salem, president of the state board of horticulture following a conference with D. S. Kinsey of Washington, D. C.

C., where he is with the federal department of agriculture. Oregon is said to be the only state in the Northwest that is without laws of this character. The railroads favor the legislation.

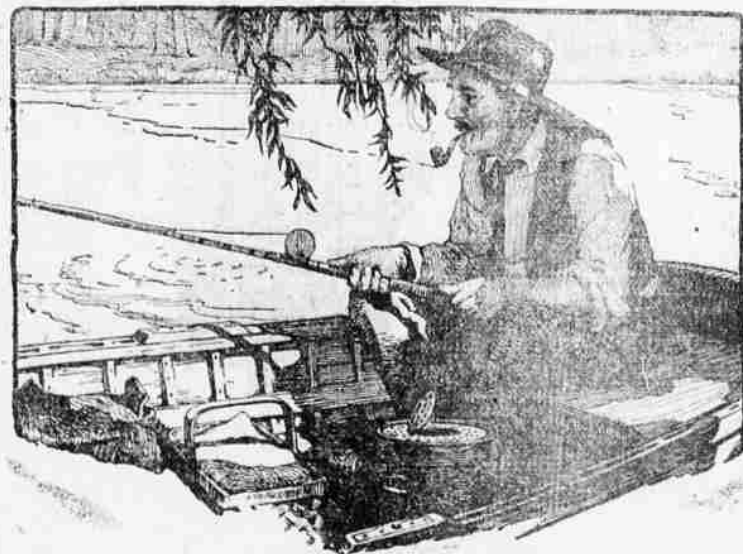
