HONOR OF THE SNOWS DEPICTED IN CURWOOD PICTURE OF OUTDOORS.

James Oliver Curwood, who has written most of the big outdoor stories presented on the silver sheet, provides an intensely human drama of the Hudson Bay country in "Jan of the Big Snows," which will be the attraction at the Star Theatre, starting Sunday.

"Jan of the Big Snows" in its screen version was directed by Charles M. Seay, an able director of outdoor productions in the motion picture industry. It will be distributed throughout the world by the American Releasing Corporation.

For his story Mr. Curwood chose the Hudson Bay country as the locale with its "he-man" characters and the spirit of adventure, romance and thrills that are evident in that isolated land. The story is replete with stirring situations and adventures, illustrating the successful manner in which seventeen trappers, the entire population of an isolated trading post, force an insolvent fur agent to observe their "honor of the big snows" with Nancy Cummings, the only woman living at the post and the beautiful bride of a fellow trapper. Among those seventeen protectors is Jan, who had never known the thrill of a love affair until the day Nancy arrived at the post, and had lived in the belief that all women were alike—the kind chiefly found in the camp resorts. His secret love for Nancy forms the basis for Mr. Curwood's story.

"These fortifications would not offer much protection in case of an attack," said Marcel Vibert, who has the role of the Sheikh, as he passed through the gates.

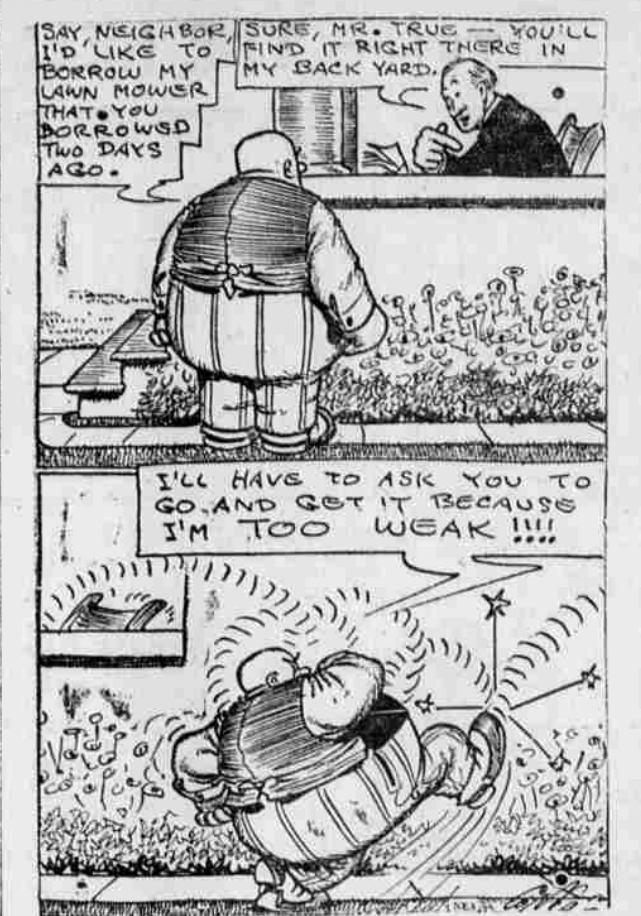

SOVIET ENRICHED BY CHURCHES

Soviet Commences Work of Melting Down the Treasures Confiscated from the Russian Churches; many Precious Jewels.

(By Associated Press.)
MOSCOW, Aug. 26.—The work of melting down the treasures confiscated from the Russian church by the Soviet government has begun at the melting works at Ekaterinburg, in the Ural mountains.

Up to the 25th of June there had been requisitioned, according to Pravda, from all parts of Russia 857 pounds of gold; 718,776 pounds of silver; 29,955 diamonds; 5,624 pearls; 26 garments embroidered with seed pearls to the total weight of 230 pounds of pearls; 59,267 rubies, emeralds and other precious stones; 2,100 pounds of gold and silver articles ornamented with diamonds and other precious stones; 763 other articles of fine workmanship but of non-precious metals; silver coins to the amount of 17,128 rubles, and gold coins amounting to 1,540 rubles.

The largest diamond secured is said to have been something over 35 carats, discovered at Petrograd. Most of the diamonds, however, are small and of doubtful value.

Moscow churches furnished about 25 per cent of the total secured up to June 25.

M. Kalenin, president of the All-Russian Central Executive Committee, says the government had hoped to realize one hundred million gold rubles from the treasures seized, but the actual value of the articles in hand at present is probably only about one-fourth of this amount. The most precious of church treasures, located in some of the historic monasteries and considered of museum value, were not seized. Also many valuable articles were secreted by the priests, or stolen before the requisition arrived.
